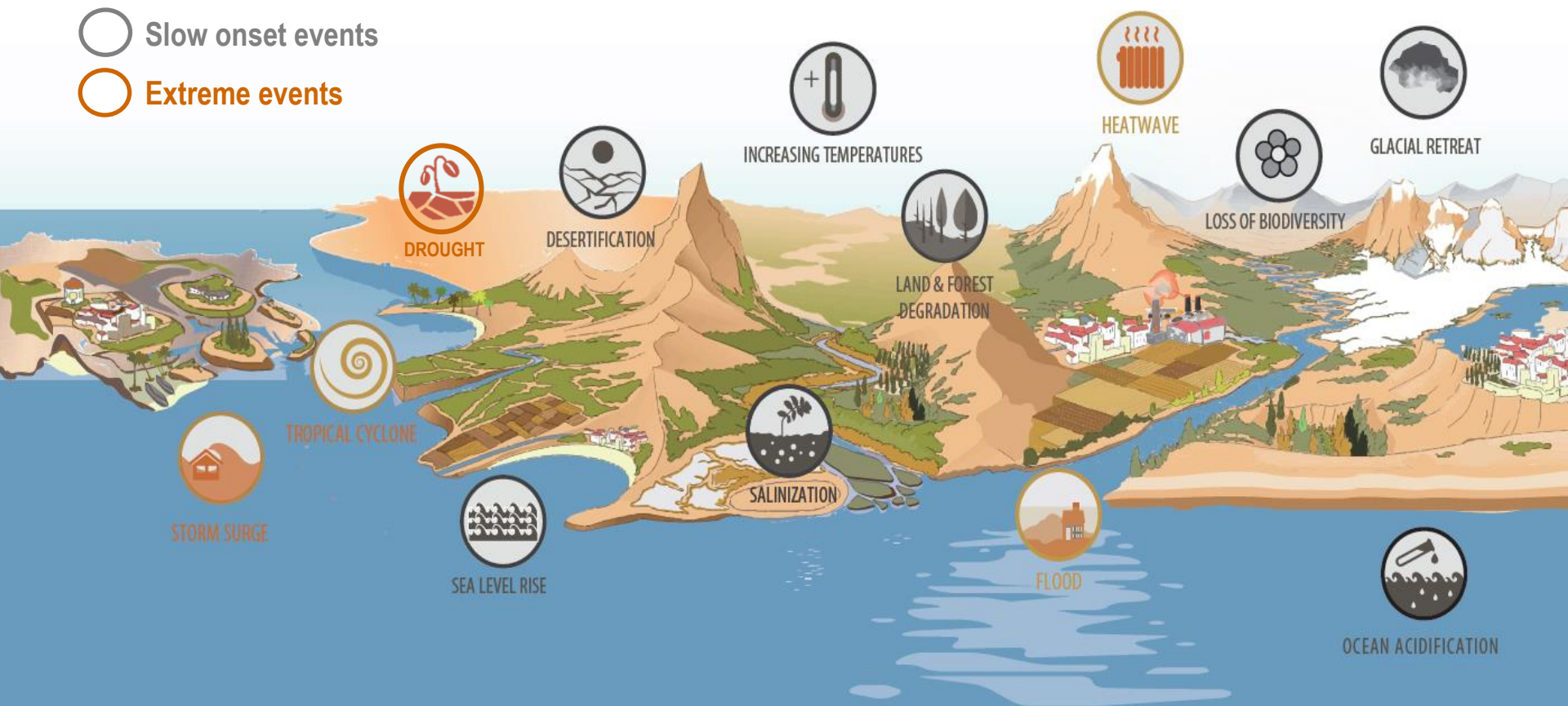

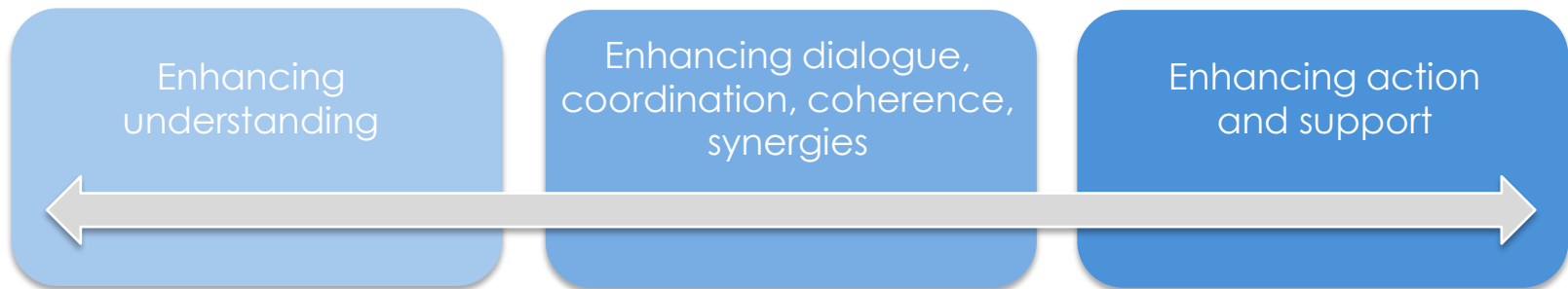


What are the Warsaw International Mechanism & its Executive Committee?

WARSAW INTERNATIONAL MECHANISM FOR LOSS & DAMAGE

To address loss and damage associated with impacts of climate change, including extreme events and slow onset events, in developing countries that are particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of climate change (Decision 2/CP.19)

THREE FUNCTIONS:



EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Guides the implementation of the functions of the Mechanism.

Composed of 20 members

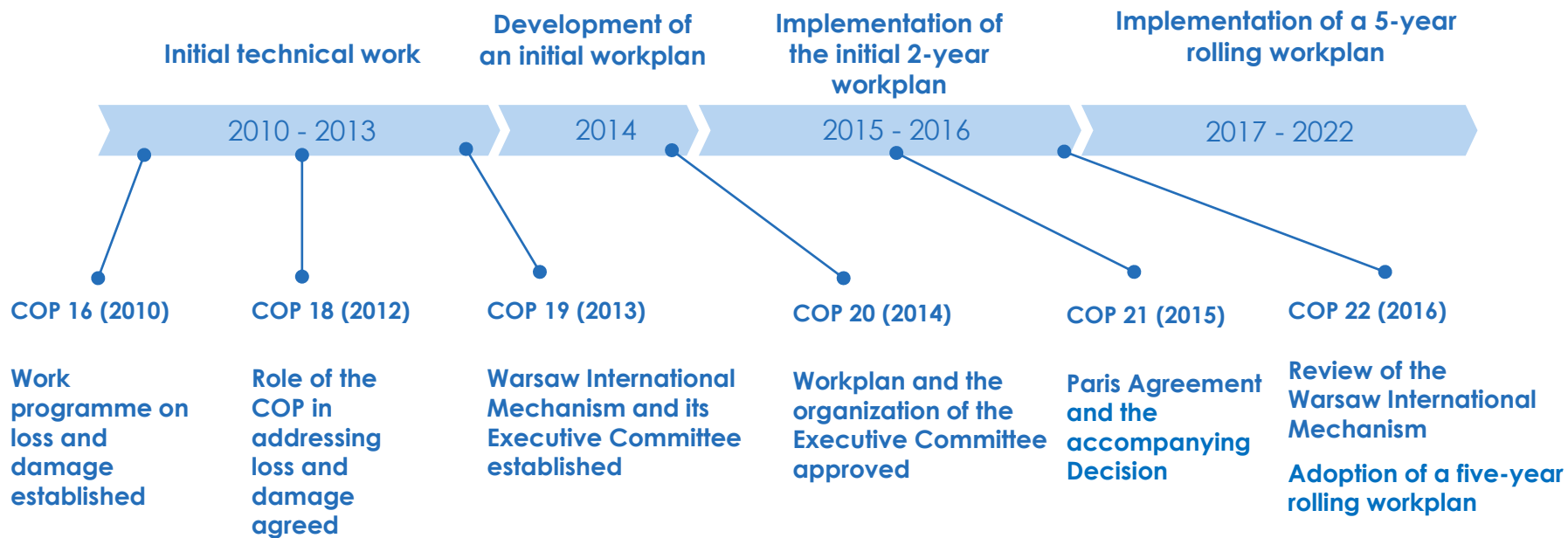


Expert groups, technical panels, etc.

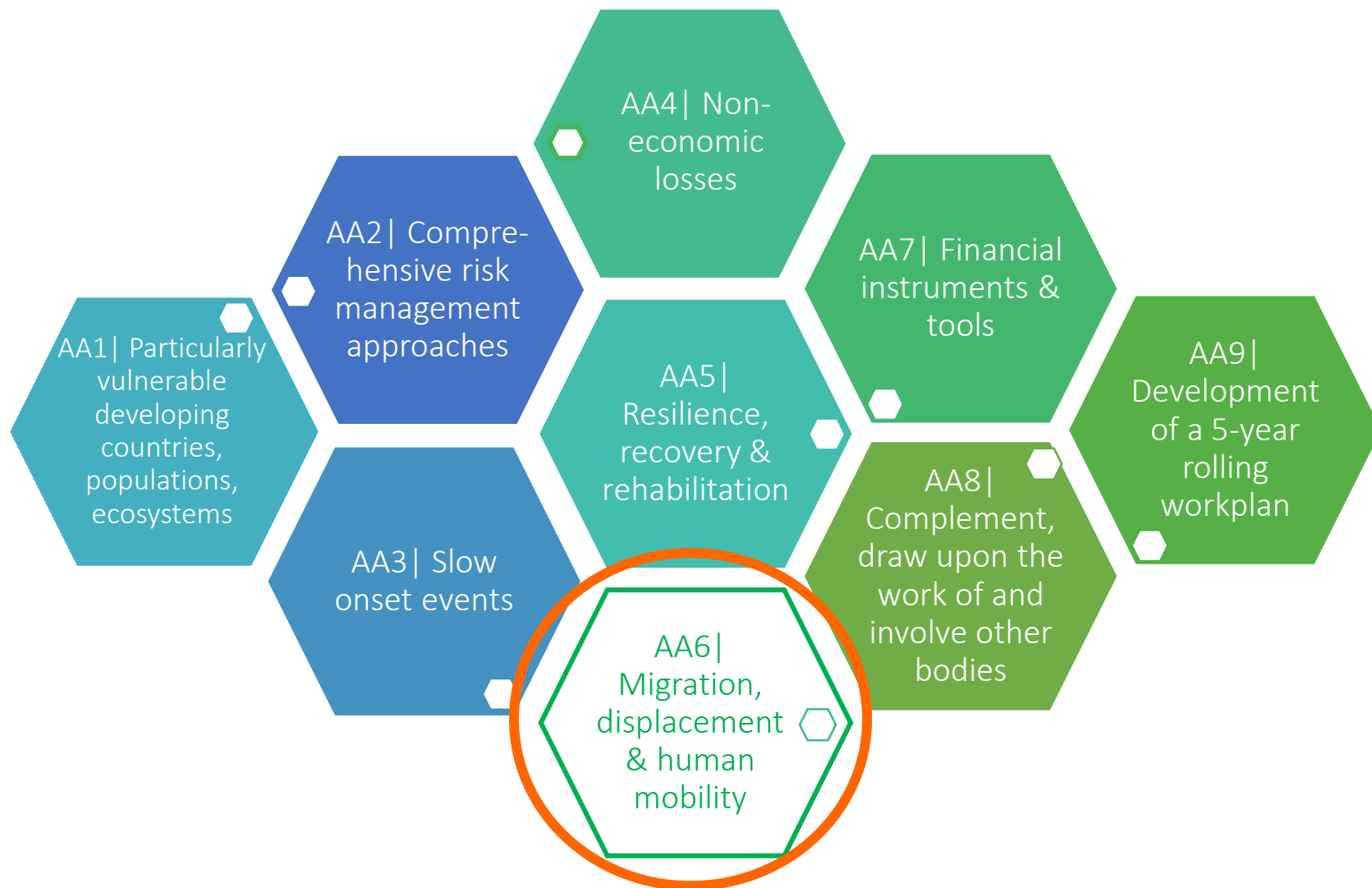
To help execute the work of the Executive Committee

Action Area 6: MIGRATION, DISPLACEMENT, HUMAN MOBILITY

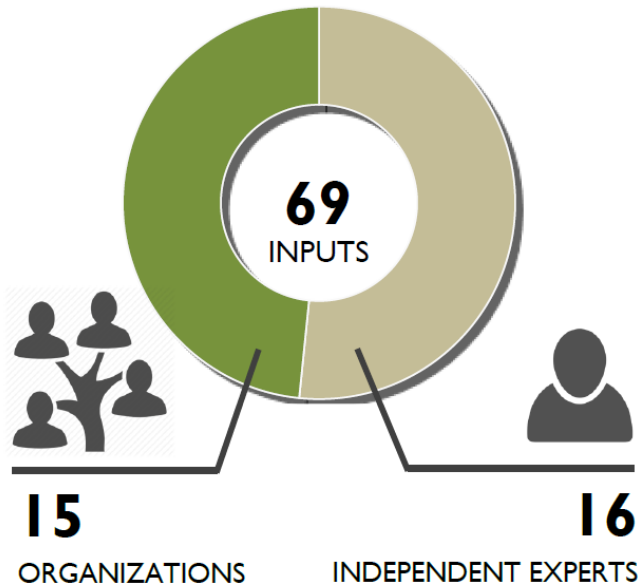
“ Enhance the **understanding of and expertise on** how the impacts of climate change are affecting **patterns of migration, displacement and human mobility**; and the application of such understanding and expertise ”

ACTIVITY (a)

Invite relevant organizations and experts to provide **scientific information** on projected migration and displacement based on projected climate and non-climate related impacts in vulnerable populations



INPUTS ON MIGRATION, DISPLACEMENT AND HUMAN MOBILITY (1)

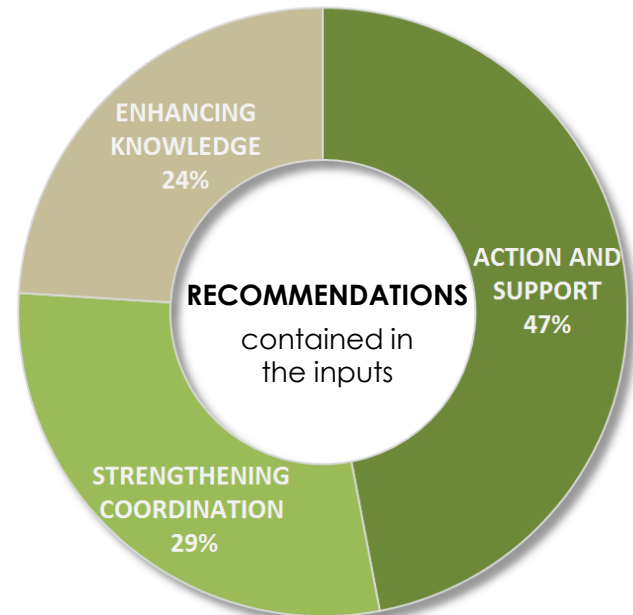


Inputs received in the form of:

INPUTS ON MIGRATION, DISPLACEMENT AND HUMAN MOBILITY (2)

Some current practices contained in the inputs

Disaster preparedness

- ⇒ Early warning systems (*Bangladesh*)
- ⇒ “Culture of prevention” campaigns (*Chile*)
- ⇒ “Life-saving activity” preventing un-safe migration (*Haiti*)
- ⇒ Special Guide on Assistance (*Mexico*)

Planned relocation programs

- ⇒ National guidelines on planned relocation (*Fiji*)
- ⇒ Planned, voluntary relocation program (*Papua New Guinea*)

Regularization requirements

- ⇒ Post-earthquake programs for Haitians (*Ecuador, Venezuela, Brazil*)
- ⇒ “Transitory resident” status (*Argentina*)
- ⇒ Consular documents (*Mexico*)
- ⇒ Review of migration laws (*Peru, Brazil, Bolivia, Paraguay*)



Institutional structures

- ⇒ Committee for Assistance to
- ⇒ Nationals Abroad established to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (*Colombia*)
- ⇒ Plan Sismo (*Mexico*)
- ⇒ Emergency Internal Committee to the Int’l Aid Unit (*Chile*)

Non-return policies

- ⇒ Suspension of involuntary return (*UK, Germany, Netherlands*)
- ⇒ Fast-track visa applications (*Canada, Australia*)
- ⇒ Ad-hoc visa categories (*Australia*)

Background

Under Action Area 6 of its [initial two-year workplan](#) 'Enhance the understanding of and expertise on how the impacts of climate change are affecting patterns of migration, displacement and human mobility; and the application of such understanding and expertise', the [Executive Committee](#) invites UN organizations, expert bodies and relevant initiatives to collaborate with the Executive Committee to distill relevant information, lessons learned and good practices from their activities.

In this context, the [International Organization for Migration \(IOM\)](#) will hold a technical meeting, on 27-29 July in Morocco, to bring together members of the Executive Committee, national and regional experts, representatives from international and United Nations organizations as well as the academic community.

THE PARIS AGREEMENT PROVIDES FOR:

- Recognition of importance of averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage
- Overarching areas of cooperation and facilitation to enhance understanding, action and support
- Establish a **task force** to complement, draw upon the work of and involve, as appropriate, existing bodies and expert groups under the Convention including the Adaptation Committee and the LDC Expert Group, as well as **relevant organizations and expert bodies outside the Convention, to develop recommendations for integrated approaches to avert, minimize and address displacement** related to the adverse impacts of climate change



EXPECTATIONS FROM THE MEETING

The Excom looks forward to leave the meeting with:

- **A set of synthesized documents** containing information on the relevant information, lessons learned and good practices from the activities of organizations and experts → **Excom will make available online**
- **Enhanced understanding**, based on sound science, of migration and displacement, including of characteristics of vulnerable populations that may become mobile owing to factors related to climate change impacts
- **Enhanced collaboration:** identify/establish relationships at multiple levels to foster partnership, dialogue, synergy
- A set of initial inputs/recommendations to support the work of the **task force on displacement**
