Summary of practical sessions

Debate teams: Participants would be separated into groups of 10 people (max). Each group would be tasked to prepare and debate the “for” or “against” side of a proposed implementation strategy: ecosystem-based approach, programme approach, etc.

Template: Participants would be divided into groups of 7 people (max). Each group will be provided a short project proposal template to fill in based on a random NAPA priority list.

Envisioning the NAP process: Participants will go through the steps and support activities of the NAP process, with a view to developing workstreams, including matching each of the core steps with relevant support activities. Participants will also explore interconnections between the different steps and activities of the NAP process.

Summary of interactive sessions

1. **Assign:** Participants would be presented with a list of programmes, projects and activities and asked to assign them to either “baseline” or “additional” financing categories.
2. **Keywords:** a list of 10 key words listing the most common best practices would be presented and participants would be asked to rank them (by applause).
3. **Re-order:** a list of key words relating to NAPA or NAP would be presented and participants would be asked to place them in the appropriate category (NAPA vs. NAP)
