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Nairobi work programme moves from first to second phase





The First Phase - a welcome approach towards implementation

Parties and organizations welcomed the approach taken so far towards implementation of the work programme, as reported from the *Informal* meeting of representatives from *Parties on the outcomes of the activities completed under the Nairobi work programme*, 7-9 April 2008, Bangkok, Thailand (Workshop report, FCCC/SBSTA/2008/5).

To date, action across the Nairobi work programme's <u>9 work areas</u> has been catalysed at all levels including through submissions from Parties and organizations, synthesis reports, web-based information such as the <u>adaptation practices interface</u> (see <u>p.6</u>), workshops and expert meetings. The programme has become a global framework on adaptation involving <u>over 100</u> intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations, the private sector and other adaptation stakeholders.

This includes the 17 organizations who have provided the 53 <u>Action Pledges</u> to carry out activities in support of adaptation. These organizations have committed publicly to the work programme and to share experiences and knowledge gained from these pledged activities at subsequent SBSTA sessions. Most recently action pledges have been received from the Ibero-American Network of Climate Change Offices (RIOCC), the Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission (IOC) and the World Meteorological Organization (WMO).

A new set of <u>Calls for Action</u> (see <u>p.5</u>) was developed at SBSTA 28, in accordance with the views of Parties. They aim to identify gaps and needs and potential actions under the different work areas of the Nairobi work programme and communicate those actions to the wider adaptation community.

The most recent <u>workshop</u> on climate modelling, scenarios and downscaling, 7 June 2008, Bonn, concluded the mandated activities under the first phase. This workshop provided a lively discussion of this work area by experts from Parties, the IPCC and other relevant organizations. A Call for Action from this workshop will be endorsed by Parties at SBSTA 29, December 2008, Poznan, Poland.

The Second Phase - catalysing action on adaptation implementation

Building on its success in the first phase, the Nairobi work programme will conduct a large range of activities in its second phase under all <u>9 work areas</u>, with particular emphasis on activities under <u>Adaptation planning and practices</u> and <u>Economic</u> <u>diversification</u>.

A number of technical workshops are planned for 2009, "Integrating practices, tools and systems for climate risk assessment and management and disaster risk reduction strategies into national policies and programmes", "Advancing the integration of various approaches to adaptation planning, including scaling up of local and community-based adaptation" and "Increasing economic resilience to climate change and reducing resilience on vulnerable economic sectors, including through economic diversification", respectively.

In addition, regional centres and networks will be promoted under the 3 work areas: methods and tools; data and observations; and climate modelling, scenarios and downscaling.with a technical workshop planned for 2010 on *"How regional centres and networks undertaking work relevant to climate change can collaborate"*.

The Nariobi work programme second phase continues in its **engagement of organizations**. This will include greater focus on community, national and regional actions and on education, training and awareness-raising.

The SBSTA encourages all organizations to submit <u>Action Pledges</u> to the secretariat and to make available to the SBSTA, via the secretariat, information on the results achieved (see <u>p.4</u>). Action pledges can respond to Calls for Action, a mandated activity (see <u>Nairobi work programme conclusions</u>) and/or the <u>objective</u> or an expected outcome of the programme.

Consideration of <u>Calls for Action</u>, which highlight the gaps and needs identified under the work programme, will be promoted by the SBSTA under the UNFCCC process and among relevant organizations, institutions, experts and communities, in order that adaptation action can be identified and undertaken at international, regional, national and subnational levels.

Calls for Action

Promoting adaptation activities and action

The SBSTA agreed in June 2008 to promote, both under the UNFCCC process and among relevant organizations, institutions, experts and communities, the consideration of Calls for Action, with a view to undertaking activities at international, regional, national and subnational levels aimed at addressing the gaps and needs identified.

(see <u>Nairobi work programme</u> <u>conclusions</u>, para 6).

Six revised Calls for Action have been developed in 5 work areas.

These six Calls for Action supersede those described in the previous eUpdate.

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Adaptation Practices Interface



The production of the <u>adaptation practices interface</u> was a mandated activity under the first phase of the Nairobi work programme. The first version of the interface became live in June 2008 and aims to provide information and links to the work on adaptation practices being carried out by partners of the Nairobi work programme, and other organizations, institutions and entities worldwide.

At present the interface is divided into two main sections:

- **Capacity building**: Work to build capacity and exchange knowledge on adaptation practice, training and experience including capacity building for knowledge exchange as well as capacity building to gain practical experience
- Practice: Current and planned adaptation practices, including information on donors supporting adaptation practices and entities implementing adaptation practices on the ground

The interface is intended as a dynamic resource that will be constantly reviewed and updated as necessary. In order to provide up-to-date and relevant information, the secretariat encourages stakeholders to provide or update information on their own organization. The secretariat also welcomes views on the presentation of information in the interface. Please contact nwp@unfccc.int.
