In decision 23/CP.18 the COP agreed to promote gender balance and improve the participation of women in UNFCCC negotiations, and adopted a goal of gender balance in bodies established under the Convention and the Kyoto Protocol to, inter alia, inform more effective climate change policy that address the needs of women and men equally.

The COP also requested the secretariat to organize an in-session workshop. The aim of this workshop is to identify action and tools that could be utilised or enhanced at an international and national level to achieve the goals of (i) gender balance under the UNFCCC; and (ii) more effective and informed gender-sensitive climate policy.
