## **BUILDING ON THE SUCCESS OF KYOTO'S MARKET MECHANISMS**

**AWG-KP UPDATE**

## STRONG POLICY WILL DRIVE PRIVATE SECTOR INVESTMENT IN LOW CARBON SOLUTIONS

The climate is changing and the investments needed for mitigation and adaptation are huge. Private sector capital will be critical to meeting this challenge, with estimates suggesting that around 85% of the total investment must come from private sources, including institutional investors such as pension funds and sovereign wealth funds. 50 – 60% of these investments must be made in emerging economies. However, no matter how committed investors may seem, private sector investment will not reach the scale required to address climate change. [More...](#)

## MORE AMBITION NEEDED IF GREENHOUSE GASES ARE TO PEAK IN TIME, SAYS NEW UNEP REPORT

Countries will have to be far more ambitious in cutting greenhouse gas emissions if the world is to effectively curb a rise in global temperature at 2 degrees C or less. This is the conclusion of a new greenhouse gas modelling study, based on the estimates of researchers at nine leading centres, compiled by the UN Environment Programme (UNEP). [More...](#)

## COULD CHICKEN MANURE HELP CURB CLIMATE CHANGE?

Here's a low-cost solution to global warming: chicken manure. At Josh Frye's poultry farm in West Virginia, the chicken waste is fed into a large, experimental incinerating machine. Out comes a charcoal-like substance known as "biochar" – which is not only an excellent fertilizer, but also helps keep carbon in the soil instead of letting it escape into the atmosphere, where it acts as a greenhouse gas.
