Parties are encouraged to consider consolidating individual statements into one statement made on behalf of a group of Parties, in which case a time limit of five minutes will apply. Given the large number of statements, we kindly suggest that statements be as brief and concise as possible, with full texts available for distribution (see below for the quantities required). If Parties do not wish to speak but would prefer only to have their statements circulated, the secretariat will make arrangements to distribute the copies and enter the statement in the records of the Conference.

Any changes in the name and rank of the speaker previously communicated to the secretariat should be provided as early as possible to the External Relations team, located in the Conference Affairs office on the upper concourse, next to the cafeteria (Ms. Dianiah Trought-Dederich), so that the speaker's list can be corrected accordingly.

Parties are kindly requested to note that the secretariat is not in a position to accommodate individual requests for changes in a Party's speaking slot. Parties wishing to make a change should arrange to exchange slots with another Party, and jointly notify the secretariat of the agreement that has been reached.
