The opening ceremony of the high-level segment will take place today at 10.00 in the Stork Plenary.

H.E. Mr. Fredrik Reinfeldt, Prime Minister of Sweden,

as well as the space available in the Plenary room, the number of participants to the opening ceremony will be limited to the available seats. This will ensure the smooth development of the ceremony in a safe and secure environment.

The ceremony may also be followed on the CCTV monitors around the conference site.

Participants are requested to proceed to the Plenary by 09.45 to ensure that the ceremony can begin promptly at 10.00.

At the end of the opening ceremony and upon the departure of the presiding dignitaries, the Stork Plenary will be opened once again to all participants in the Conference.

The secretariat trusts that these arrangements will allow Parties, United Nations organizations, intergovernmental organizations and civil society organizations to be represented at the opening ceremony.

Informal ministerial round table for a shared vision on long-term cooperative action

The President will convene an informal ministerial round table for a shared vision on long-term cooperative action during the high-level segment. The round table will enable ministers and heads of delegations to exchange views on how they intend to work in a collaborative manner to combat climate change. The round table is scheduled from **16.00 to 19.00 hours today**. The round table will also include the participation of the Secretary-General of the United Nations. Given the importance of the issue, the President would like to encourage ministers and other heads of delegation to participate in the round table in order to provide political impetus to the negotiations in 2009.

To assist ministers and other heads of delegation, the President has prepared a background document ([FCCC/CP/2008/6](#)) to help frame the debate. The document proposes a number of issues on which discussion might focus, including the importance of a comprehensive shared vision for long-term cooperative action vis-à-vis the challenges posed for mitigating and adapting to climate change and creating a suitable financial and technology support infrastructure to enable the necessary actions. The document also includes questions that may assist ministers and other heads of delegation in focusing their interventions during the round table.

To further facilitate the discussion, the President will organize the round table around three key topics, with approximately one hour of discussion per topic:

- Long-term cooperative action on mitigation, towards achieving the ultimate objective of the Convention.
- Preparing ourselves for unavoidable climate change, building resilience and implementing adaptation plans.
- The architecture that will deliver on finance, technology and capacity-building and on the reporting of actions and support for such actions.

There will be no formal speakers list prepared in advance of the session. Following the opening of the round table, ministers should raise their flags to indicate their interest in making a contribution. The President will request the understanding of ministers on time limitations for interventions, which ideally **should not exceed two minutes for each speaker**. Ministers may wish to reflect upon which of the three topics would be most appropriate for their intervention.

The round table will take place in **Alpine Accentor** (Plenary 2). There will be one seat for the minister or head of delegation, and one seat behind for an adviser. Additional seating will be available at the sides and back of the room. Interpretation will be available. The round table will be broadcast live on CCTV and webcast.

The President will issue, under his responsibility, a summary of the round-table discussions for inclusion in the report of COP 14 on Friday, 12 December 2008.

Given the large number of statements, we kindly suggest that statements be as brief and concise as possible, with full texts available for distribution (see below for the quantities required). If Parties do not wish to speak but would prefer only to have their statements circulated, the secretariat will make arrangements to distribute the copies and enter the statement in the records of the Conference.

During the high-level segment, any last-minute changes in the name and rank of the speaker previously communicated to the secretariat should be provided to Ms. Dianiah Trought-Dederich directly in Plenary, so that the speaker's list can be corrected accordingly.

Parties are kindly requested to note that the secretariat is not in a position to accommodate individual requests for changes in a Party's speaking slot. Parties wishing to make a change should arrange to exchange slots with another Party, and jointly notify the secretariat of the agreement that has been reached.

All Parties are kindly requested to provide the Conference Officer with 20 copies of their statements in advance to meet the needs of the interpreters and the Conference records. Parties wishing to have their statements distributed during the plenary meeting are requested to provide 350 copies. These copies may be delivered to the Conference Officer's table.
