#### Special announcement

NGO participation will be limited to 300 delegates on Thursday, 17 and Friday, 18 December at the UN climate change conference to maintain a peaceful environment for the negotiations and ensure the necessary level of security when over 110 Heads of State and Government will be present. Regrettably, security considerations and the limitation of the capacity of the Bella Center have made it impossible to open the venue to a larger number of civil society representatives.

#### Alternative conference venue for observer organizations

The Host Country in cooperation with the Danish NGO-network Peoples' Climate Action (PCA) is organizing an alternative conference venue at Forum Copenhagen for the observer organization representatives that will not be able to enter the Bella Center Thursday, 17 and Friday, 18 December. TV links to the Bella Center will be established that will show the proceedings at COP 15. A wireless internet connection will be available.
