Opening ceremony High Level Segment

A ceremony attended by His Excellency Felipe de Jesus Calderon Hinojosa, President of the United Mexican States will mark the opening of the High Level Segment of the sixteenth session of the Conference of the Parties and the sixth session of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol.

The high level segment will take place in Plenary “Ceiba” and will be addressed by the Executive Secretary, the Secretary-General of the United Nations and His Excellency the President of the United Mexican States.

The Ceremony will close after the opening statements and the High Level Segment will continue with statements by Heads of States and Governments and speakers on behalf of Groups.

Participants are asked to take their seats by 14.45 in Plenary “Ceiba” (Sunrise) to ensure that the ceremony can begin promptly at 15.00.

Parties, UN and IGOs are guaranteed four seats per delegation. NGO participants are advised to refer to the Information Note sent on Saturday, 4 December 2010. A limited number of overflow seats are available on a first come, first served basis. Security and fire regulations do not permit participants to stand in the room. Please note that security will enforce this requirement.

The proceedings can also be followed on the screens in Plenary “Cenote” (Azteca) and Room Maguey (Sunrise), on the CCTV screens throughout the Conference Center and on the stage screen at Cancunmesse.

The High level segment will continue on Wednesday, 8 December and Thursday, 9 December with statements for other Heads of States and Governments, Deputy Heads of States and Governments, Ministers and other heads of delegations. Statements by Inter-governmental and Non-governmental organizations will be heard on Friday, 10 December.

PROGRAMME OF THE HIGH-LEVEL SEGMENT

The high-level segment, to be attended by Heads of States and Governments, ministers and other senior officials will be inaugurated during the afternoon of Tuesday, 7 December. Statements by Heads of States and Governments, ministers and other heads of delegation will be heard in joint meetings of the COP and CMP on 8 and 9 December. The high-level segment will conclude on Friday, 10 December with statements by Inter-governmental and Non-governmental organizations and the adoption of decisions and conclusions by the COP and the CMP.

The high level segment will take place in Plenary “Ceiba” and opening addresses will be delivered by the Executive Secretary, the Secretary-General of the United Nations and His Excellency the President of the United Mexican States.

During the High-Level Segment on Wednesday, 8 and Thursday, 9 December each Party will have the opportunity to address the plenary. Only one intervention for Party has been foreseen. Heads of State and Heads of Government will be the first to make national statements followed by Ministers, and Party representatives.

The list of speakers is included in this addendum and will be made available in the Daily Programme throughout the high level segment. **All speakers are reminded that they should be present in the plenary at least ten minutes before (or two speakers ahead of) their presentation.**

Speakers will be escorted by an usher during the presentation of the previous speaker from the seat of their delegation to a reserved seating arrangement close to the podium and they will be invited to take the floor. After their statement, they will be escorted again to their respective seat behind their country plates or they will leave the plenary to attend other commitments.

The plenary is open for all Parties and observer States and as per normal procedure there will be four seats available behind each country name plate for the High-Level representative of each Party.

The Daily Programme is available electronically at unfccc.int/. Participants are kindly reminded to consult the CCTV monitors for any last-minute changes to the Daily Programme. In order to reduce paper consumption, participants are kindly requested to retain copies of documents throughout the sessions.



Arrangements for bilateral meetings

Parties who may wish to organize bilateral meetings between Head of States or Governments should proceed to do so through the standard diplomatic channels.

Other practical and logistical questions related to the High-level segment should be directed to the External Relations team located in the Conference Affairs Office (CAS) on the ground floor of Sunrise Lobby.

If Parties do not wish to speak but would prefer to only have their statements circulated, the secretariat will make arrangements to distribute the copies and enter the statement in the records of the Conference.

Parties interested in taking up this offer should communicate their interest to the External Relations team, who during the high level segment can be found in Plenary Ceiba. Any other changes to the speakers' list should also be brought to the attention of the External Relations team.

Parties are requested to note that the secretariat is not in a position to accommodate individual requests for changes in a Party's speaking slot. Parties wishing to make a change should arrange to exchange slots with another Party and jointly notify the secretariat of the agreement that has been reached.

All Parties are kindly requested to provide the Conference Officer with **20 copies** of their statements in advance to meet the needs of the interpreters and the Conference records. Parties wishing to have their statements distributed during the plenary meeting are requested to provide **300 copies**. These copies may be delivered to the Conference Officer's table located beside the podium in the plenary.
