## STATEMENT BY COLOMBIA, CHILE, COSTA RICA, DOMINICAN REPUBLIC, PANAMA, and PERU

- Much has been achieved over the past years. We have established robust governance structures that will help us to deliver on actions and commitments under the Convention. These include, among others, the GCF, the AC, the Standing Committee, and the Climate Technology Center and Network as well as the NAMA Registry, a REDD+ mechanism and NAPs.
- However, we are no closer than before to actually meeting the objective of the Convention.

There is a complex agenda before us in Doha, but we must remember that Doha is not an end, it is a milestone in an ongoing process we have all committed to in Durban.

- At the present juncture, a first step must be to ensure that we deliver on a second commitment period for the Kyoto Protocol. We express our deep appreciation for those Parties that have already signaled a willingness to ratify a second commitment period, and trust that others will follow suit.
- Despite any shortcomings, the KP has demonstrated that a rules-based system is necessary if we are to deliver sufficient mitigation ambition within the minimal window we still have.
- However, this political will needs to be underpinned by ensuring continuity between the two commitment periods. We must avoid any gap and send the necessary market signals ensure that the flexible mechanisms can continue to operate. Annex 1 non KP Parties must also take on comparable commitments with equally stringent accounting rules.
- Since Bali we have achieved much on the LCA track, and we decided a year ago that it is now time for implementation. We must therefore deliver in Doha a smooth transition and successful closure of this track. For this to happen, we must identify where continued work and implementation should be carried out for each of the issues identified in the Durban decisions. In addition, we need certainty and predictability on the continuation of finance between 2012 and 2020, in accordance with the commitment already made by developed country Parties to provide USD 100 billion per year by 2020 for adaptation and mitigation in developing countries.
- On ADP we must continue the fruitful discussions we started in Bangkok on the two workstreams, and we express once again our appreciation to the two co-Chairs for their judicious guidance of our work. We look forward to continuing to work with them, and to reflecting on the proposals they will put forward for continuing work beyond Doha.

We stand ready to work with all Parties over the decisive next two weeks to deliver a strong outcome in Doha
