Information on the round-table discussions during the high level segment

The SBI, at its eighteenth session, endorsed the dates of 10 to 11 December 2003 for the high-level segment to be attended by ministers and other heads of delegation. The SBI also recommended that round-table discussions be the mode of exchange during the high level segment.

The Bureau subsequently agreed that three round-table discussions will be convened on the following themes:

- (1) Climate change, adaptation, mitigation and sustainable development
- (2) Technology, including technology use and development and transfer of technologies
- (3) Assessment of progress at the national, regional and international levels to fulfil the promise and objective enshrined in the climate change agreements, including the scientific, information, policy and financial aspects.

The President will call on several colleagues to assist him in co-chairing the round-table discussions:
