U.S. Views on the Contents of Article 6.2 Authorizations

Authorizations under Article 6.2 are domestic policy documents that guide the implementation of the cooperative approach.

QUESTION: Should the content of the 'copy of the authorization' be (a) standardized mandatory form (b) standardized optional form and (c) no form/free-form??

- The United States can support the development of a template for the information that shall or should be reflected in an authorization of the use of ITMOs from a cooperative approach.
- Such a template can assist Parties in preparing and formatting their authorizations, should they choose to use it.
- The voluntary nature of this template is consistent with the optional templates provided to assist Parties in preparing Article 6.2 reports.

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- **Key views on "shall" vs. "should" list**: Required elements need to be those that are necessary for participants in the approach or underlying system to identify mitigation outcomes covered by the authorization, and how/when the approach and 6.2 guidance are implemented.
- Key views on "shall" list: Retain all elements except "(h)" (move to "shoulds", as it is type-specific) and consolidate (e) and (g).
- Key views on "should" list: Could consider shifting several items in paragraph 9 to "shall" list: 9(a), (c), (d), (e), (g), (h), (k)-(n), (s), (v)
- Other environmental integrity elements should be clearly connected to the Initial Report (see next slide).

Article 6.2 authorizations are not an Article 6 Reporting Instrument.

QUESTION: How to avoid duplication of information and conflicting data in authorizations provided through various reporting instruments?

- Some information elements in the Initial Report may need to be repeated in the authorization.
 - Authorizations guide / inform the implementation of a cooperative approach
 - Initial Reports contain information summarizing the nature and scope of the cooperative approach that is established in the authorization.
- Information elements pertaining to environmental integrity (versus operative conditions) are more appropriate for inclusion in the Initial Report, for example, as guidance for its completion in relation to the authorization.

Strengthening the transparency and completeness of Initial Reports is paramount.

QUESTION: How to avoid duplication of information and conflicting data in authorizations provided through various reporting instruments?

- With the benefit of real-world examples of Article 6.2 guidance implementation, Parties should consider taking steps to enhance upfront reporting—in terms of specificity and detail needed to enhance understanding of the cooperative approach.
- Simple enhancements (beyond previous slide proposal), e.g.,
 - Requesting Parties to attach or cross-reference supporting information about methods, tools, procedures applied in an underlying regulatory framework or certification mechanism, incl. any meths specified for cooperative approach use.
 - Formatting the template to support Parties to prepare information for reporting on the discrete information elements required in 18(h)-(i).
