Since the start of the second phase in June 2008, the Nairobi work programme continues to gain momentum. The Programme now has over <u>130 partner</u> <u>organizations</u>. This includes a number of private sector businesses who are the first to join the secretariat's "Adaptation Private Sector Initiative" (p4).

The implementation of the programme continues to be structured around the two thematic areas: "Impacts and vulnerability" and "Adaptation planning, measures and actions", and its nine areas of work.

To date, twenty two partner organizations have provided a total of 63 <u>Action Pledges</u> to the programme, with six organizations also having provided updates of their work towards implementing these pledges (p5).

For consideration at the Poznan Climate Change Talks, the secretariat was mandated to produce two technical papers and a number of reports to provide updates on implementation of the Programme. These papers and reports are an extremely important means of communicating information to Parties so as to assist their deliberations on adaptation action under the Convention (p8).

For our Nairobi work programme partners and those organizations, institutions and private businesses interested in the Programme, two new publications, recently published by the secretariat, provide easy to read information on the work of the Nairobi work programme (p8).

- 3. Climate modelling, scenarios and downscaling
- 4. Climate related risks and extreme events
- 5. <u>Socio-economic</u> information
- 6. Adaptation planning and practices
- 7. Research
- 8. <u>Technologies for</u> adaptation
- 9. <u>Economic</u> diversification

The first phase of the Nairobi work programme (2006-June 2008) provided a solid basis on which to base the activities and expected outputs of the second phase (June 2008-December 2010).

Organizations and institutions, including partners, that have national and regional representation are encouraged to develop specific activities at the national and regional level, including education, training and awareness-raising, in support of the Nairobi work programme, and to make information on the results achieved available to the SBSTA, via the secretariat, for its consideration.

Gaps and needs on adaptation identified in the Programme's workshops and expert meetings are summarized in the <u>Calls for Action</u>. Seven Calls for Action are now available covering six work areas. Organizations may use these Calls for Action to identify action in support of the programme. The latest Call for Action was developed following responses at the <u>workshop</u> on climate modelling, scenarios and downscaling, 7 June 2008, Bonn. This Call for Action will be considered for endorsement by Parties at SBSTA 29, Poznan, Poland.


During the second phase of the programme, a number of technical workshops are planned including under the work areas of <u>adaptation planning and practices</u>, <u>socioeconomic information</u>, and <u>economic diversification</u> as well as a workshop covering the work areas: <u>methods and tools</u>; <u>data and observations</u>; and <u>climate modelling</u>, <u>scenarios and downscaling</u>. Partners are encouraged to contact us if they are interested in contributing to any of these workshops. Details of the workshops will be posted on the Nairobi work programme <u>Calendar</u> as soon as they become available.

The secretariat continues to update its adaptation resources on the UNFCCC webpages (p9). This includes the adaptation practices interface under the Nairobi work programme. Further resources include the <u>Local Coping Strategies database</u> and the just published <u>Adaptation Funding Interface</u>, mandated under the SBI. Partners are encouraged to use and provide updates and comments on all resources.

The impacts of climate change are already being felt by a large number of societies. The effects these impacts may have on a range of sectors including agriculture and food supply, freshwater reserves, human settlements, infrastructure and tourism are already being incorporated into the business strategies of forward-looking international companies.

The secretariat has begun the <u>Adaptation Private Sector Initiative</u> in line with the renewed mandate for the engagement of private sector companies provided by the SBSTA (see SBSTA 28 Report, FCCC/SBSTA/2008/6 para 26).

The aims of the initiative are:

- to support the work of the private sector in advancing its own activities and strategies on adaptation to climate change;
- to bring the full weight of the private sector's work on corporate social responsibility to bear on the issue of climate change adaptation;
- to draw on the private sector's ability to deliver new and innovative technological and financial solutions to climate change adaptation.

As part of the Adaptation Private Sector Initiative, the secretariat is showcasing information on climate change adaptation carried out by private companies. Companies are invited to add to this online inventory by highlighting work being done either as part of core business strategy and as part of Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR).

Private sector partners are invited to capitalize on the main deliverables of the work programme, such as technical papers, outreach publications and online resources.

So far, over a dozen leading international companies have joined the initiative. Activities carried out by these companies cover a variety of businesses and sectors including the insurance industry, consultancies, environmental management, infrastructure and transportation sector, water sector and financial sector. Of these companies, a number are currently preparing action pledges.

- Inhance the integration of adaptation into sustainable development plans.

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The initial adaptation practices interface mandated by SBSTA 25 and produced in June 2008 has been given a face lift. The new-look <u>adaptation practices interface</u> contains over 120 entries containing information on adaptation practices carried out by organizations, research institutes, NGOs and governmental organizations worldwide as well as key publications, adaptation strategies and databases associated with these adaptation projects. Information can be filtered according to type of organizations, regional focus, work focus (such as sectoral criteria) and means of delivery.

Partners are strongly encouraged to update the secretariat on any suggested changes to their entry on the interface or of any new adaptation practices. A <u>webform</u> is available online for submissions of updates and new contributions. Send to nwp@unfccc.int.


An interface on <u>adaptation funding</u> options has recently joined the growing family of online products offered by the secretariat.

Further existing resources on the UNFCCC adaptation webpages include the <u>Local</u> <u>Coping Strategies</u> database, which provides coping mechanisms for communities that have adapted to specific hazards or climatic conditions. These mechanisms may be transferred to communities that may just be starting to experience similar climatic conditions as a result of climate change.

The <u>Compendium</u> on methods and tools to evaluate impacts of vulnerability and adaptation to climate change provides information on available frameworks, methods and tools, and their special features. The secretariat is in the process of updating and streamlining the compendium.

The <u>Calls for Action</u> identify the gaps and needs on adaptation for each area of work under the Nairobi work programme.

For partners working in Least Developed Countries (LDCs), the LDCs' National Adaptation Programmes of Action (NAPA) may provide a useful resource on which to base adaptation action. The secretariat is upgrading its web pages on LDCs to provide easily accessible information on NAPAs, including an index of NAPA projects by country and by sector, and downloadable files of projects for each country and for each sector.
