3. Co-chairs' proposal for a draft letter of invitation and a summary of further discussion points

Dear xxx,

On behalf of the Executive Committee of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts (hereinafter referred to as the Executive Committee) of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) and in our capacity as its Co-Chairs, we are pleased to present you an opportunity to enhance synergy between your work and that of the Executive Committee in the areas related to migration, displacement and human mobility.

The Conference of the Parties (COP), at its nineteenth session, established the Warsaw International Mechanism to address loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change through its three main functions: enhancing knowledge and understanding of comprehensive risk management approaches; strengthening dialogue, coordination, coherence and synergies among relevant stakeholders; and enhancing action and support, including finance, technology and capacity building. The Executive Committee is mandated to guide the implementation of these functions. The COP, at its twentieth session, approved an initial two-year workplan of the Executive Committee (Workplan).

Action Area 6 of the Workplan focuses on enhancing the understanding of and expertise on how the impacts of climate change are affecting patterns of migration, displacement and human mobility; and the application of such understanding and expertise.

In this context, the Executive Committee invites relevant organizations and experts to provide, by x date, **scientific information on projected migration and displacement based on projected climate and non-climate related impacts in vulnerable populations**

Expected results of this activity are, as envisioned by the COP, enhanced understanding, based on sound science, of migration and displacement, including of characteristics of vulnerable populations that may become mobile owing to factors related to climate change impacts; and synthesized information made available on the relevant information, lessons learned and good practices from the activities of organizations and experts. The COP also envisions enhancing collaboration through undertaking this activity.

The Annex to this letter contains additional information that you may find helpful in considering the above invitation by the Executive Committee.

Possible elements which the Excom may need to further consider (without prejudging its inclusion or final placement – i.e. annex or cover letter):

Comment #1

It may be a good idea to draw reference to and quote para 50 of the Decision at COP 21 that speaks to a task force re displacement. It is important to make the linkages.

Comment #2

While lessons learned and good practices fall under AA6(b), noting the linkage between AA6(a) and (b), it would be useful here to draw on and highlight a few key examples such as the Migration with Dignity of Kiribati associated with SLR.

Comment #3

SLR is a key area that may require specific focus (modelling discourse analysis, other future-oriented analysis).

Comment #4

Note the linkage between AA6 (a) and (b). Information to be distilled should be useful to those displaced by climate change impacts. Outputs can therefore be solutions-oriented and include policies strategies and action plans to assist persons at national, regional and international levels to provide guidance to them on where to start, what assistance exists, what they would require, etc.

Comment #5

It would be useful to consider what currently exists in these institutions from the perspective of practice. This could inform a document outlining the challenges faced in the various regions and how they are currently being met. Consider the existing policies, strategies and action plans and how effective they have been, in preparing the template. This may help to identify gaps or shortcomings that can be used to inform good practices.
