## ADP intervention

Thank you Co-Chairs and distinguished delegates for the opportunity to submit a written statement for the website highlighting our key priorities for this session.

This time in Bonn, governments must show clear and tangible progress on an agreement that will be finalized in Paris, which must be fair and equitable and accelerate the ongoing transition away from dirty fossil fuels to 100% renewable energy.

That transition must begin now; in order to meet 1.5°C we cannot delay action until 2020.

All countries need to escalate their pre-2020 emission reduction efforts significantly to close the ambition gap, with developed countries taking the lead. Furthermore, CAN proposes to use workstream 2 as a facilitative ambition mechanism that identifies additional mitigation potential and provides the incentives to support these activities.

Besides, to secure a credible outcome in Paris and ambitious climate action on the ground, a key pillar of the Paris agreement will be the "finance package" covering both the pre- and the post-2020 period. In Bonn, developed countries should provide a plan on how they intend to ramp up support to developing countries to the promised \$100bn per year by 2020.

On post-2020 finance, while all countries need to do their bit to shift the trillions and to decarbonize investments, Bonn should advance discussions on periodically setting collective targets for the provision of support after 2020, with separate public finance targets for adaptation and mitigation and linked to a formal process to periodically identify support requirements of developing countries to enhance action. Also, more emphasis in Bonn should be given to exploring options for establishing a process to mobilize finance from alternative sources and for improving the balance between mitigation and adaptation when allocating financial support.

The Paris agreement must also establish a clear transparency and MRV system that will allow the world to get clear, reliable information on how commitments and contributions are being implemented and how effective they are in reducing GHG emissions.

Streamlining the negotiation text must further ensure progress towards an adaptation goal, which will help to build resilience for all communities, clearly recognizing that rising temperatures will require greater adaption efforts. An explicit section on loss and damage on equal footing with adaptation is essential to the Paris outcome and must be a priority for the streamlining exercise.

Finally, all is nothing without a formal ratchet-up mechanism to review and update countries' commitments in addition to the pre- and post-2020 ambition mechanisms. This is intrinsically linked to the question of differentiation, which must be dealt with adequately, section by section, during the June session.
