

Tropical Forest Alliance 2020 Overview

Mission Goal and Objectives

Mission

Tropical Forest Alliance 2020 (TFA 2020) is a public-private partnership in which Partners take voluntary actions, individually and in combination, to reduce the tropical deforestation associated with the sourcing of commodities such as palm oil, soy, beef, and paper and pulp and does so by tackling the drivers of tropical deforestation using a range of market, policy, and communications approaches.

Goal

TFA 2020 will contribute to mobilizing and coordinating actions by governments, the private sector, and civil society to reduce tropical deforestation related to key agricultural commodities by 2020.

Cross-Cutting Objectives

TFA 2020 and its Partner countries, companies, and civil society organizations work together to:

- Improve planning and management related to tropical forest conservation, agricultural land use, and land tenure.
- Share best practices for tropical forest and ecosystem conservation and commodity production, including working with smallholder farmers and other producers on sustainable agricultural intensification, promoting the use of degraded lands, and reforestation.
- Provide expertise and knowledge in order to assist with the development of commodity and processed-commodity markets that promote the conservation of tropical forests.
- Improve monitoring of tropical deforestation and forest degradation to measure progress.

TFA 2020 Partners

TFA 2020 Partners include governments, the private sector (including consumer goods companies and commodity producers and traders), and civil society. The opportunity to become a Partner is open to any entity legally recognized as a private company, a government, or a non-governmental organization (NGO). Criteria to become a TFA 2020 Partner, listed below, are designed to be as inclusive as possible, but all Partners are expected to be active in endeavors that contribute to achieving TFA 2020 goals.

• Support the TFA 2020 mission, goal and objectives.



- Actively involved in programs and initiatives to end commodity driven tropical deforestation; please describe these actions with specificity.

Current TFA 2020 Partners

Current TFA 2020 Partners include the Governments of the United States, the United Kingdom, Norway and the Netherlands; <u>The Consumer Goods Forum (the CGF</u>); and NGOs including <u>CDP</u>, <u>Code REDD</u>, <u>Conservation International</u>, <u>Forest Trends</u>, <u>Global Canopy Programme</u>, <u>The</u> <u>Sustainable Trade Initiative (IDH)</u>, <u>National Wildlife Federation</u>, <u>Permian Global Advisors LLP</u>, <u>Poligrow Colombia Ltd</u>, <u>Rainforest Alliance</u>, <u>SNV</u>, <u>Solidaridad Network</u>, <u>The Nature</u> <u>Conservancy</u>, <u>Tropenbos International</u>, <u>WeForest</u>, <u>Wildlife Conservation Society</u>, <u>World</u> <u>Resources Institute</u> and <u>World Wildlife Fund</u>. The Government of the Republic Indonesia cohosted the first major TFA 2020 workshop in June 2013 and is actively engaged with TFA 2020 to implement concepts and actions that were highlighted at the event. The Government of Liberia and several other NGOs and private sector entities have also expressed a desire to join TFA 2020.

TFA 2020 Approach

- Partners take voluntary actions, individually and in combination, to reduce the tropical deforestation associated with the sourcing of commodities such as palm oil, soy, beef, paper & pulp.
- TFA 2020 brings Partners and other interested stakeholders together to share information on actions they are taking to address deforestation issues, identify needs and gaps in actions necessary to further reduce deforestation, and help facilitate relationships between different Partners to take relevant actions. Connecting Partners and others for this purpose is done via e-mail, telephone, and/or in-person introduction, at meetings initiated by TFA 2020 or informally around related events organized by others.
- Tackle the drivers of tropical deforestation using a range of market-based, policy, and communications approaches.
- TFA 2020 and its Partners work together to:



- Share best practices for tropical forest and ecosystem conservation and commodity production.
- Provide expertise and knowledge in order to assist with the development of commodity and processed-commodity markets that promote the conservation of tropical forests.
- Support activities that help avoid topical forest deforestation such as improved planning and management related to tropical forest conservation, agricultural land use and land tenure; and improved monitoring of tropical deforestation and forest degradation to measure progress.

TFA 2020 Partners Contribute in Different ways

Companies

- Provide a market for commodities that are sourced so as to reduce tropical deforestation.
- Work with suppliers to develop tropical deforestation-free sources for the commodities which they are purchasing.
- Ensure compliance with legislation and regulations that support the conservation of tropical forests.

Governments

- Engage in efforts to improve planning and governance related to tropical forest conservation, agricultural land use, and land tenure.
- Facilitate sharing of supply chain best practices and develop and support models for agricultural development that encourage rehabilitation of degraded lands for cultivation and allow smallholders to participate in markets.
- Share best practices for tropical forest and ecosystem conservation including experience working with smallholder farmers on sustainable agricultural intensification methods, promoting the use of degraded lands, and reforestation.
- Advise and provide technical assistance on monitoring and reporting of tropical deforestation, and forest degradation.

Civil Society

- Provide policy and technical expertise.
- Work with their extensive networks to facilitate implementation on the ground, track developments, and draw attention to evolving issues.
- Review progress toward collective commitments and build public support for successful approaches and actors.

Collaborative Efforts to Produce Better Results



A great deal of good work is already being done on tropical deforestation by government, industry, and civil society. The Alliance will help align these efforts in complementary ways and find synergies between ongoing efforts.

Beyond this we expect that by collaborating closely we will be able to identify specific areas where we can work together. For example:

- Combining resources and expertise to improve the yields of smallholder farmers.
- Developing incentives for growers to plant on degraded lands rather than in areas of high conservation value tropical forests.
- Applying objective and scientifically robust systems for measuring tropical deforestation, and forest degradation.

Frequently Asked Questions and Answers

What has TFA 2020 accomplished to date?

- Since its inception, TFA 2020:
 - Convened a successful workshop in Jakarta, Indonesia that explored pertinent issues and actions needed to increase the sustainability in the palm oil and paper and pulp commodity value chains;
 - Articulated strategic objectives to support the activities of member entities in reducing tropical deforestation;
 - Expanded its number of Partners;
 - Formed work groups to explore possible value-added contributions for TFA 2020 in Indonesia and South America;
 - Facilitated relationship-building and new connections between Partners; and
 - Partners have launched additional global activities supporting TFA 2020 goals including the Initiative for Sustainable Forest Landscapes (ISFL), which seeks to scale up land-management practices across large landscapes and Global Forest Watch, which combines satellite data and crowd sourcing to provide near-realtime forest monitoring and action.

How is TFA 2020 governed?

• Currently, TFA 2020 is directed by all Partners and it is anticipated that a representative Steering Committee will be formed and will be supported and informed by the Secretariat.

What is TFA 2020's relationship with The Consumer Goods Forum?

• TFA 2020 was conceived as a way to align the CGF's commitment to achieve zero net deforestation by 2020 with parallel interests of governments, civil society and financial



institutions. TFA 2020 and the CGF share a common goal to help eliminate deforestation from the supply chains of certain key commodities. TFA 2020 also works with other private sector entities that want to eliminate commodity-driven deforestation from their supply chains. Achieving these goals is assumed to be more effectively addressed in partnership with TFA 2020 given its linkages with governments, NGOs and businesses where individual strengths of each entity can be leveraged. TFA 2020's reputation and its thought leadership will benefit the CGF, TFA 2020 Partners, other stakeholders and the world.

What is TFA 2020's relationship with the Government of the United States?

• The Government of the United States is a current TFA 2020 Partner and was one of the co-founders of TFA 2020 along with the CGF.

Where is TFA 2020 housed?

• The home of TFA 2020 will be determined upon selection of a permanent Secretariat. Meridian Institute serves as its interim Secretariat.

How is TFA 2020 funded?

• Partners fund operations of the TFA 2020 Secretariat and Steering Committee members serve voluntarily.

Does TFA 2020 fund activities for reducing commodity-driven deforestation?

• Individual Partners, groups of Partners, or Partners and other stakeholders could decide to fund and implement activities on their own. No collective funding, implementation or monitoring structures will be set up directly through TFA 2020.

How is TFA 2020 different from other organizations involved in reducing commodity-driven deforestation?

- TFA 2020 is not a standard setting, a certifying or a funding organization. TFA 2020 will not develop, support, or endorse any particular standards or certifying bodies in connection with its work. It emphasizes:
 - Catalyzing a range of actions including business-to-business collaboration and exchange, learning and information exchange between sectors and regions, and exchanging technical support and strategies between various parties.
 - Serving as a partnership in which all participants from all sectors recognize the importance of working together to solve a global environmental and development challenge.

Where does TFA 2020 focus its networking and capacity-building efforts?



• TFA 2020 currently focuses on tropical deforestation in Southeast Asia, relevant regions of South America, and Central and West Africa.

What are TFA 2020's near-team priorities?

• As TFA 2020 continues to mature, building on and diversifying its membership to include representation from producer countries, companies and NGOs will be an overall priority. This will happen most effectively through the engagement of potential partners in specific action-oriented projects and initiatives. TFA 2020 will also proceed with the intent to track and measure success to monitor progress towards achieving its goal of no net deforestation by 2020.

Specifically, in 2014 TFA will prioritize its action, capacity-building and networking activities in the following areas:

- Following up on actions defined in the Jakarta workshop, some of which include increasing the visibility and adherence to common sustainability standards of smallholders for palm oil production, increasing the use of degraded lands and reducing the use of high carbon stock areas for palm oil production, and supporting provincial jurisdictional initiatives in Central Kalimantan.
- Scoping out an appropriate role for TFA 2020 regarding beef, soy and palm oil in South America, being considerate of the fact that several related activities are already underway and understanding that the unique diversity of TFA 2020 could add value. It is conducting a careful assessment of ongoing activities in South America to identify gaps and areas where it may meaningfully contribute.
- Expanding the geographic focus of TFA 2020 strategically to include another country or region, perhaps in Africa.

How I can become involved with TFA 2020?

Are there eligibility requirements for becoming a Partner in TFA 2020?

• Any entity interested in becoming a Partner is eligible to apply if they can demonstrate the three criteria listed above. After an application is submitted, the TFA 2020 Secretariat conducts an informal interview with applicants to gather information about the applicant's past, present and planned engagement in initiatives to end commodity driven tropical deforestation. The Secretariat shares interview findings and recommendations with current Partners who then decide whether prospective entities are to be formally admitted.

Can my organization be involved with TFA 2020 without becoming a Partner?

• Yes. TFA 2020 aims to be a forum where partnerships between governments, business and civil society can be forged to catalyse and promote meaningful actions to reduce



commodity-driven deforestation. It provides a venue to bring its Partners and other interested stakeholders together to share information on actions they are taking to address deforestation issues and to identify needs and gaps in terms of the actions to be taken to achieve zero net deforestation by 2020, and help facilitate relationships between Partners to take relevant actions.
