#### Background

As outlined in the Informal Note on the second session of the Ad Hoc Working Group on The Durban Platform For Enhanced Action (ADP2),<sup>1</sup> the Co-Chairs of the ADP have made arrangements for a workshop under workstream1 of the ADP.<sup>2</sup> The workshop will focus on scope, structure and design of the 2015 agreement – with aspects relating to the application of Convention principles, ways of defining and reflecting enhanced action, and experiences and lessons learned from other processes also being explored, thereby encompassing all four aspects of the ADP conclusions.<sup>3</sup>

#### Questions

The presentations and discussions will be guided by the focused questions set out by the Co-Chairs in their informal note,<sup>4</sup> which reflect some of the themes that have been highlighted as key concepts for the scope, structure and design of the 2015 agreement – such as ambition, durability and flexibility, and the application of the Convention principles:

- How would the agreement be designed to incentivize ambitious national and international action?
- How would the agreement be designed to ensure durability and flexibility to respond to changes in national circumstances and evolving scientific knowledge over time?
- How will the principles of the Convention be applied in the new agreement?

#### Approach and format: Expert presentations and panel discussion (3 hours)

The workshop will be structured in two parts. Each part will begin with two expert presentations (of 10 minutes each) on the design aspects of the 2015 agreement. They would focus on how the abovementioned key concepts would translate into the scope, structure and design of the 2015 agreement, and how the 2015 agreement could complement and incentivize action at the national level (part 1), and how the principles of the Convention will be applied in the 2015 agreement (part 2).

In each part, the presentations will be followed by a panel discussion, in which the panelists will be invited to reflect on points raised in the presentation, as well as an opportunity for open exchange among all participants of the workshop.
