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NATIONAL STATEMENT BY HON. JOHN MOFFAT FUGUI MP, MINISTER FOR ENVIRONMENT, CLIMATE CHANGE, DISASTER MANAGEMENT, AND METEOROLOGY - HIGH LEVEL SEGMENT OF UNITED NATIONS CLIMATE CHANGE CONFERENCE IN, CANCUN, MEXICO - 9th DECEMBER 2010

Madam President:

Allow me, at the outset, to thank the Government and People of the Republic of Mexico for hosting the Sixteenth Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (COP16) and the Sixth Conference of the Parties serving as the Meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol (MOP6), here, in Cancun.

The hospitality rendered to my delegation, **Madam President**, is simply - the best!

Allow me to thank also the United Nations Climate Change Secretariat for providing the necessary technical and administrative support to parties at COP16 and MOP6. The support rendered to the parties has been <u>superb</u>!

Madam President:

When my delegation was preparing to come to Cancun, we were told that, like Solomon Islands – Cancun is another Paradise on Earth.

But, Madam President:

Even Paradise has its <u>share of problems</u>. Today, <u>Small Islands</u>

<u>Developing States</u> are under <u>enormous threat</u>. <u>Least Developed</u>

<u>Countries</u> are under <u>serious threat</u>. <u>Cancun</u> also is under <u>threat</u>. Because of climate change, our Paradise is under <u>severe threat</u>!

Madam President, I have observed the economy of Cancun is founded on <u>ocean-based tourism</u>. Like Cancun, Solomon Islands' economy is founded on <u>ocean-related resources</u>. I understand the economies of other small islands developing states are founded on <u>oceanic resources</u>. <u>All</u> these economies are under threat!

Madam President:

Recent science tells us that <u>climate change</u> is causing <u>land degradation</u> and desertification in land-locked and Least Developed Countries.

The adverse effects of climate change have obviously affected our <u>food</u> security; water security; and the <u>fecundity of the land</u>. Climate change

has caused <u>land degradation</u> and <u>desertification</u>. If we are not careful, this would lead to the <u>silent cleansing of humanity from least developed</u> countries.

Madam President:

We, therefore, have a <u>moral obligation</u> to <u>save humanity from doom</u>. It is our <u>moral duty</u> and <u>obligation</u> to <u>protect biodiversity on planet earth</u>.

But in order to <u>save humanity</u> and <u>in order to protect biodiversity</u> in our <u>fragile ecosystems</u>, <u>we must reach consensus in Cancun!</u> Cancun must deliver on a <u>balanced outcome</u>.

Madam President:

Such a "balance outcome" must be appreciated within the scope of intergenerational equity. Balance outcome must be seen from the standpoint of our children. Balance outcome must be seen from the lens of our grand children. It must not be perceived from our own selfish, egoistic, and self-centered interests.

Madam President, allow me to say, therefore, that it was with <u>vested</u> and <u>self-centered interest</u> that we have <u>negotiated for a balanced solution</u> in Bali. Again, we have <u>failed miserably to sign a balanced outcome in</u>

Copenhagen. The important question here, Madam President is: "Can Cancun make a difference?"

Madam President, Cancun can make a difference <u>if we listen to the quiet voices of our children</u>; if we heed the silent cries of our grand children.

"Can Cancun listen?

I hope Cancun can <u>not only listen</u> but also <u>hear the silent voices of our children</u>. I hope Cancun can <u>hear the continue cries of our grand children</u>.

The world is waiting! Our children are watching! And our grand children could hardly wait for us to do the right thing, here, in Cancun!

Can Cancun deliver on that balanced outcome?

Madam President:

Delivering a "balanced outcome" demands <u>strong leadership by Annex 1</u> <u>countries</u>. It requires <u>committed followership from non-Annex 1 Parties</u>. The least-developed countries and small islands developing states are ready to follow the <u>footsteps of our climate change leaders</u>, when they <u>make a difference - here - in Cancun</u>.

Madam President, we, therefore, call on all developed countries to show strong leadership by accepting their historical responsibilities. We also call on developing countries to show commitment by cutting down on greenhouse gas emissions.

Madam President, It is <u>our world that is at the heart of our concern</u>. It is the <u>voice of our children that we are hearing</u>; and, it is the <u>cries of our grand children</u> that we should heed.

For all of us - Annex 1 and Non-Annex 1 Parties alike - let us take action based on the principle of "common but differentiated responsibilities and respective capabilities" to make a difference in Cancun!

Madam President:

You know fully well that <u>responsibility comes with accountability</u>. Our children will <u>hold us accountable</u> if we <u>don't heed their call</u>. Our grandchildren will <u>hold us accountable</u> if we <u>don't hear their call for commitment!</u>

We must, therefore, understand that the outcome of Cancun will determine <u>our destiny vis-à-vis our responsibility and commitment!</u>

Finally, **Madam President**, allow me to conclude by saying that - we are <u>accountable for our actions in Cancun</u>. We are also equally accountable for our <u>inactions in Cancun!</u>

Let us, therefore, show strong leadership on climate change.

Let us, therefore, accept our historical responsibilities.

Let us, therefore, show committed followership on climate change.

Let us, therefore, <u>cut down on our emissions</u>.

Let us, therefore, hear the silent cries of our children.

Let us, therefore, heed the call of our grandchildren.

Let us, finally, agree to a "balanced outcome" in Cancun.

Will Cancun deliver?

Sure, Cancun CAN!
