The global-mean component uses the MAGICC coupled gas-cycle/climate model, which is the model that was used to make the projections of global-mean temperature given in the IPCC Third Assessment Report. Users can emulate TAR results or expand these to other emissions scenarios. The SCENGEN components translate the global-mean projections to regional scale (gridpoint) results using results from 17 different coupled atmosphere/ocean general circulation models. The uncertainty analysis allows results to be given in probabilistic terms.
