If Parties do not wish to speak but would prefer only to have their statements circulated, the secretariat will make arrangements to distribute the copies and enter the statement in the records of the Conference.

During the high-level segment, any last-minute changes in the name and rank of the speaker previously communicated to the secretariat should be provided to Ms. Dianiah Trought-Dederich directly in Plenary 1, 517 C, so that the speaker's list can be corrected accordingly.

Parties are kindly requested to note that the secretariat is not in a position to accommodate individual requests for changes in a Party's speaking slot. Parties wishing to make a change should arrange to exchange slots with another Party, and jointly notify the secretariat of the agreement that has been reached.
