Given the large number of statements, we suggest that statements be as brief and concise as possible, with full texts available for distribution (see below for the quantities required). If Parties do not wish to speak but would prefer to only have their statements circulated, the secretariat will make arrangements to distribute the copies and enter the statement in the records of the Conference.

Any changes in the name and rank of the speaker should be provided as early as possible to the External Relations team, located in the Conference Affairs Services office in Hall 15B (Ms. Dianiah Trought-Dederich), so that the speaker's list can be corrected accordingly.
