Further to the note by the Executive Secretary, the system to regulate access by IGOs/NGOs to the Bella Center has been implemented.

Beginning Tuesday, 15 December, no one without a secondary card will be allowed to enter the Bella Center to register. Nobel Peace Prize laureate Wangari Maathai becomes a United Nations Messenger of Peace

United Nations Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon has designated 2004 Nobel Peace Prize laureate Wangari Maathai as a United Nations Messenger of Peace with a special focus on the environment and climate change.

Professor Maathai will be inducted by the Secretary-General **today**, **15 December 2009**, **at 15:30**, in Auditorium Elvira Madigan. Participation is open and media will be allowed to pose questions at the conclusion.

Recognized for her work in support of the environment, democracy and women's rights, Professor Maathai joins eleven other United Nations Messengers of Peace who advocate on behalf of the United Nations.

Messengers of Peace are individuals who possess widely recognized talents in the fields of art, academia, literature, sports and entertainment, helping to raise worldwide awareness of the United Nations' ideals and activities. Through their public appearances and contacts with the international media and humanitarian work, they expand public understanding of how the United Nations helps to improve the lives of people everywhere.
