Connecting laptops to the Internet at COP 10

Participants with laptops may access the Internet (PlugNplay network) through two services available in the conference venue (primarily Green Pavilion). These services are available in two categories. In neither case does any change need to be made to your system.

Category #1. Loose network (nodes) cables are available in the Computer Centre for delegates and observers and in the Media Centre for journalists. To use this service, simply plug the cable into your laptop. Cables are black or yellow in colour.

Category #2. WiFi (Wireless) network services are available throughout the conference facility. To use this service, a computer equipped with a Wireless network component is needed. The wireless network is identified by the name: PlugNplay. Choose the PlugNplay point with the highest percentage of availability for better service. No changes are needed to your system to take advantage of this service. The best "hot spots" are indicated with PlugNplay banners.

Caution! The PlugNplay network is open, with no restrictions or protection. In order to ensure safe operation, please follow the best practice tips below:

1. Install and/or update your **antivirus** software.
2. Activate your **personal firewall** if your computer has such software installed. WindowsXP users should activate the **Windows firewall** feature.
3. Assign your computer a suitable name e.g. the name of your organization, company or delegation.
