### Information on the panel discussions during the high-level segment

The Subsidiary Body for Implementation (SBI), at its twentieth session, recommended that panel discussions be the mode for exchanges among ministers and other heads of delegation during the high-level segment. Four themes were also agreed.

The Bureau considered the details and format of the panel discussions among ministers and other heads of delegation. The following arrangements reflect the guidance received from the SBI and the Bureau on these matters.

The President has invited six panel members, as well as a moderator, to lead the discussion for each panel. There is a balanced representation among panel members, taking into account geographical representation and diversity of points of view.

The four panel discussions will be convened as follows:

- (1) The Convention after 10 years: accomplishments and future challenges (Wednesday, 15 December 2004, from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m., Plenary I)
- (2) Impacts of climate change, adaptation measures and sustainable development (Thursday, 16 December 2004, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., Plenary I)
- (3) Technology and climate change (Thursday, 16 December 2004, from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m., Plenary I)
- (4) Mitigation of climate change: policies and their impacts (Thursday, 16 December 2004, from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m., Plenary II)

<u>Category #2</u>. WiFi (Wireless) network services are available throughout the conference facility. To use this service, a computer equipped with a Wireless network component is needed. The wireless network is identified by the name: PlugNplay. Choose the PlugNplay point with the highest percentage of availability for better service.
