# Background paper on the organization of SCF work in 2016

## I. Background

At the 21<sup>st</sup> Conference of the Parties (COP 21), Parties welcomed the report of the Standing Committee on Finance (SCF) and endorsed its workplan (6/CP.21), as provided in its report. In addition, further guidance was provided to it in other relevant decisions of COP21, including but not exclusively through the Paris Agreement. Annex II to this document identifies these tasks and activities, the relevant documents, and the timelines for these various areas of work as mandated by COP 21, as well as from previous COP decisions.

### II. Objective

This document outlines a possible approach to the work of the SCF in 2016. The SCF may wish to consider this information with the aim of agreeing on an overall approach to its work implemented through: distribution of work and working modalities (see section III below, Annex I with a proposed workflow chart, and Annex II containing a proposed timeline and approach for meetings and inter-sessional work); an approach to outreach and communications (see section IV below and Annex III containing a draft approach to outreach and communications); and linkages with the thematic bodies of the Convention and the Subsidiary Body for Implementation (see section V below and Annex IV mapping the work of other thematic bodies and overlaps with SCF).

## III. Distribution of work and working modalities of the Standing Committee on Finance in 2016

The chart presented in Annex I below provides an overview of a possible approach for the distribution of work throughout 2016, including the proposed provisional agendas of the meetings of the SCF and the inter-sessional work. Additionally, various proposals with regards to working modalities in order to assist the SCF in meeting all deliverables by COP 22 are outlined below:

a) The SCF may wish to focus discussions during the meetings of the SCF at a higher level instead of technical details, focusing on providing guidance on technical work to be undertaken inter-sessionally, as well as specific recommendations to be forwarded to the COP;

b) Based on such overall guidance, the SCF may wish to focus the inter-sessional work of the SCF on technical work, which may be conducted by working groups as appropriate. The working groups would be composed of SCF members who have signed-up based on their specific areas of expertise and interest and will be facilitated by one or two members of the SCF with the support of the secretariat. Annex II contains a list of mandated work areas and in the last column a section to identify members of such working groups. SCF members are encouraged to review the list and indicate which working group they are interested to join, and to identify co-facilitators as appropriate;

c) To increase the overall time management during its meeting, the SCF may also wish to agree that, in case that a specific agenda item was: a) introduced during the previous meeting, b) significant work had been conducted inter-sessionally, and c) further work would need to be taken forward in a breakout group during this meeting, the specific agenda item would not have to be introduced in a formal plenary setting. Should this be the case, the work of the breakout group could be resumed immediately without such a formal introduction in plenary. This would give more time for technical work to be taken forward in breakout groups during SCF meetings, and allow more time for plenary sessions for the report back of breakout groups during which the agenda item could either be closed by the Committee, or high-level guidance could be provided to the working group for the continuation of work on an inter-sessional basis;

d) In terms of workload management, it is expected that the SCF will have a high workload between the 12th and the 13th meeting (April – July/August (tbc) 2016), but also between the 13th and the 14th meeting (July/August (tbc) – September (tbc) 2016).



## IV. Outreach and Communication

As in previous years, and in light of the nature of many of the tasks the SCF will conduct in 2016, the SCF may wish to update its approach to outreach and communications in order to facilitate its technical work and its overall outreach and communications with stakeholders involved in climate finance within and outside the Convention. An updated draft mapping of areas for outreach and collaboration, outlining the specific approach per respective activity and task of the SCF in 2016 is contained in Annex III of this document which the SCF may wish to take into consideration. In addition, it is proposed for the SCF to organize a side event during the forty-fourth session of the Subsidiary Bodies (SB) in order to allow the SCF to provide Parties and other interested stakeholders with a general overview of the status of the implementation of its work plan.

# V. Maintaining linkages with the thematic bodies of the Convention and the Subsidiary Body for Implementation (SBI)

In line with its mandate to maintain linkages with the thematic bodies of the Convention and the Subsidiary Body for Implementation (SBI), and in light of the manifold synergies and linkages between the thematic bodies, particularly due to recent developments emanating from the evolving Convention institutional architecture based on the outcomes of the Paris Agreement, the SCF may wish to consider its approach towards collaboration with the various thematic bodies of the Convention. Annex IV of this documents on the work of the thematic bodies of the Convention and their potential cooperation with the Standing Committee on Finance in 2016, outlines the mandates of the various bodies and recent developments, areas of overlaps/synergies with activities of the SCF in 2016, and the proposed approach for collaboration with the various thematic bodies of the Convention, which the SCF may wish to take into consideration.
