“the application of knowledge and expertise to the enhancement of those factors that contribute to organizational effectiveness”.

(Kibbe, 2004, p. 5)

What do we want to achieve?

- Capacity building that is **sustained** (focused on long-term enhancement of capabilities), **predictable** and **effective**
- **Strengthened institutional arrangements** and **enabling environments** to support the achievement of the agreement
- **Effective and regular assessment** of the progress made and effectiveness of capacity building activities
- **Enhanced collaboration** between institutions and mechanisms undertaking capacity building within and outside UNFCCC
- Integrated capacity building at **national, regional levels**, with both **governmental** and **non-governmental stakeholders**

20 years of experience under UNFCCC

Much efforts have been made ... but:

- Short-term
- Project driven rather than programmatic (embedded into a broader low-emission, climate-resilient, development strategy)
- Consultancy driven
- Focus on reporting strengthening, rather than underlying infrastructure or data collection and supply
- Focus on individual capacity building
- All over the place: scattered around various area of work: Adaptation, Mitigation, Tech Transfer, MRV, finance....yet no real coordination or monitoring of efforts and effectiveness of activities.
- No effective decision making process based on evidence
- Likely not enough funding (not seen as a priority), but difficult to monitor progress since lack of data/success criteria

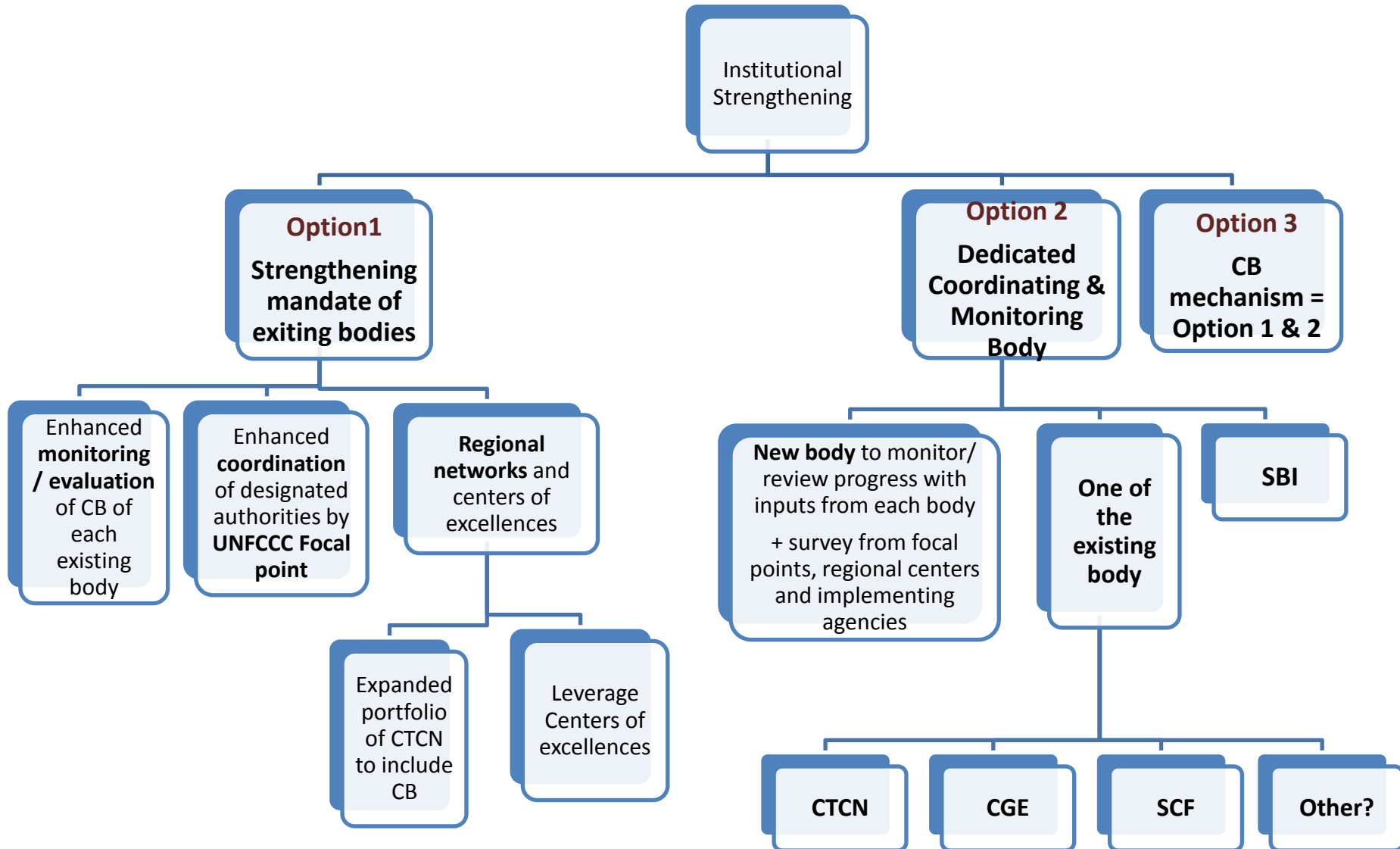


Better Prospect...

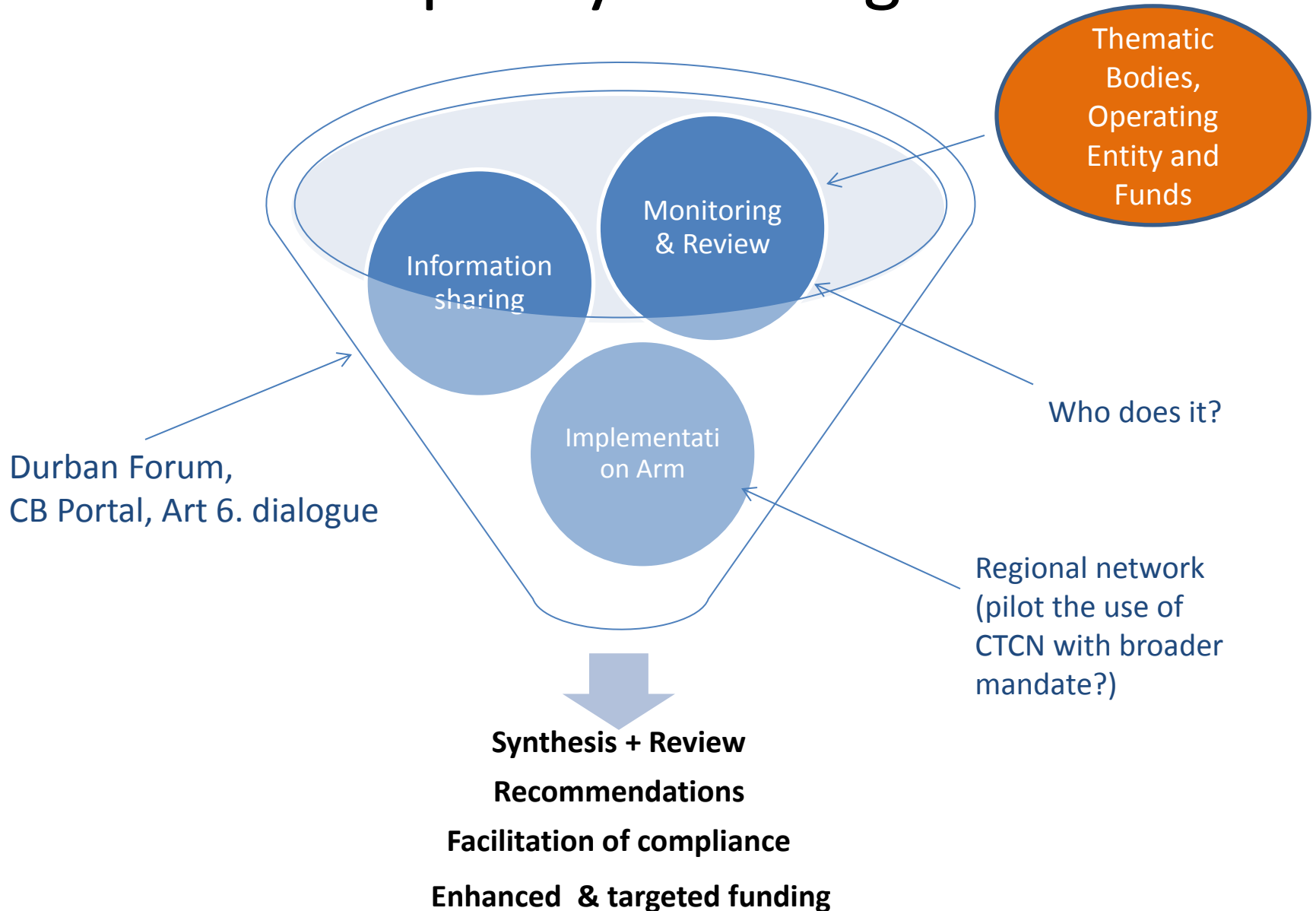
- Capacity Building:

Options for enhancing the international institutional framework

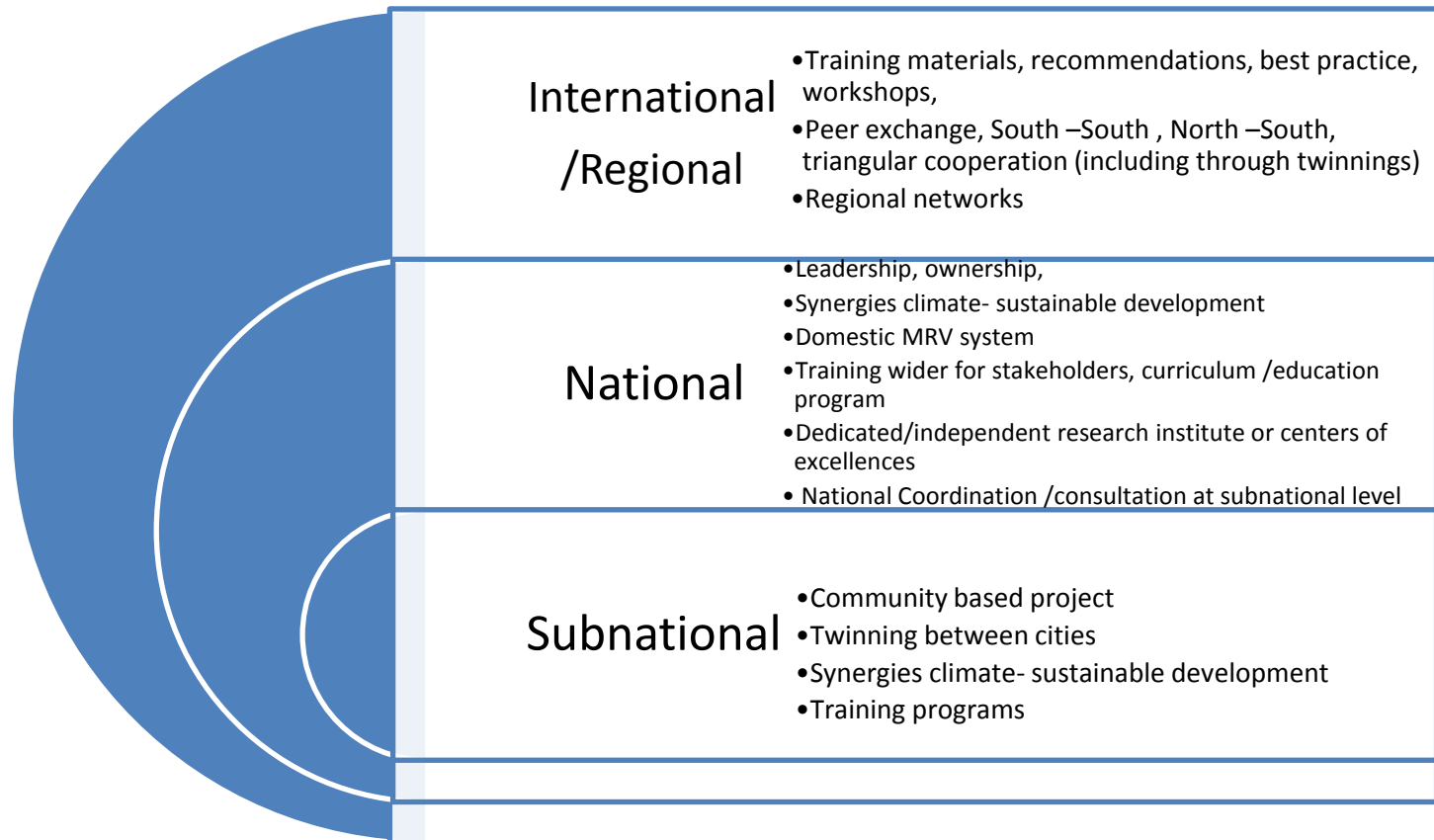


Option 3: An Institutional Model for Capacity Building
