Overview of the practical sessions

Warm-up session: Participants to be engaged in an open discussion on addressing adaptation: reducing vulnerability and addressing adaptation in the context of sustainable development. Countries are encouraged to provide examples on their specific experiences.

Integrating cross-cutting issues in addressing adaptation: Participants would be divided into groups to discuss considerations on integrating cross-cutting issues in addressing adaptation at different levels (community, sector to national) based on their country experiences. Participants would also identify both successes and challenges. Participants may choose from the following cross-cutting issues:

- Gender sensitive approaches
- Focus on most vulnerable communities and systems
- Participation and involvement of local communities
- Disaster risk reduction/management
- Food security
- Water
- Engagement of the private sector

Stocktaking: Participants will work in groups to discuss the questions on stocktaking as provided in the NAP technical guidelines using their own country experiences, i.e.:

- Where do we stand regarding effective short- and long-term adaptation activities?
- What data and knowledge are available to assess current and future climate risks, vulnerability and adaptation?
- How can the storage and management of this data and knowledge best be coordinated?
- What gaps can be identified regarding the capacity, adequacy of data and information, and required resources to engage in the NAP process?
- What barriers exist to effectively design and implement adaptation?

Envisioning the NAP process: Participants will work in groups to discuss how to conduct scoping of the NAP process by going through the questions contained in Table 2 of the NAP technical guidelines (*participants do not need go through the whole list of questions but to select a few to get a general feel*). The groups will then discuss how to develop an approach for the NAP process with stocktaking as an important first step. They will discuss how to organize work into workstreams using the objectives of the NAP process. The groups will finally discuss how to design supporting activities (e.g. capacity-building, outreach, education, research) for the NAP process based on a gap analysis.
