NAP Expo 2015: Realizing the National Adaptation Plan process

Background

The objectives of the NAP Expo in 2015 are to:

- a) Provide a platform for focused interactions on aspects of the process to formulate and implement national adaptation plans through special events and training opportunities;
- b) Offer an opportunity for countries to exchange information on their adaptation planning activities;
- c) Serve as a forum for sharing technical knowledge on adaptation assessments and programme design;
- d) Exchange best practices on approaches to address common vulnerabilities and climate change risks:
- e) Offer a platform for countries and those providing technical and financial support to interact.

The agreed objectives of the NAP process are:

- a) to reduce vulnerability to the impacts of climate change, by building adaptive capacity and resilience:
- b) to facilitate the integration of climate change adaptation, in a coherent manner, into relevant new and existing policies, programmes and activities, in particular development planning processes and strategies, within all relevant sectors and at different levels, as appropriate (decision 5/CP.17, paragraph 1).
