



## Concept note for Technical event on analysis, assessment and reporting on the impacts of measures taken to combat climate change, including cross border impacts, recalling Article 3, paragraph 5, of the Convention

Date: Thursday, 11 June 2026, 15:00–17:00 (CEST)

Venue: Addis Abeba, World Conference Centre Bonn (WCCB), Bonn, Germany

### Background

In decisions 6/CP.30, 2/CMP.20 and 14/CMA.7, the Conference of the Parties (COP), the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol (CMP), and the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Paris Agreement (CMA) mandated the Forum and its KCI to conduct an awareness-building and information-sharing activity at SB 64 under Activity 6 of the 2026–2030 workplan. Activity 6 calls on the Forum and KCI to analyse, assess and report on the impacts of measures taken to combat climate change, including cross-border impacts, recalling Article 3, paragraph 5, of the Convention.

Article 3, paragraph 5, of the Convention affirms that Parties should cooperate to promote a supportive and open international economic system conducive to sustainable economic growth and development in all Parties, particularly developing country Parties. It further provides that measures taken to combat climate change, including unilateral ones, should not constitute a means of arbitrary or unjustifiable discrimination or a disguised restriction on international trade

### Objective

The objective of this technical session is to build awareness of, and share information, related to, methodologies, and approaches for analysing, assessing and reporting on the impacts of measures taken to combat climate change, including cross-border impacts. The event will support Parties and relevant stakeholders in understanding existing analytical frameworks, data gaps and opportunities for strengthened reporting, in a manner consistent with the principles of Article 3, paragraph 5, of the Convention
