
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Climate Literacy

Climate literacy is at the heart of any meaningful sustainable climate action. With adequate education on climate change and extreme weather events, young people are able to understand their indispensable roles in promoting climate justice in Africa, including protecting the environment, advocating for sustainable climate policies, and driving innovative green solutions in frontline communities. Particularly, relevant climate education will inform young people on how their day-to-day activities significantly affect the environment and how they can consciously protect the environment and advance climate justice. Additionally, climate literacy helps young people to create awareness on the reality of climate change to the not-so-informed populations, through simplifying complex scientific terms and possible ways to promote climate justice. More importantly, climate literacy is significant to help young people demystify several myths on the reality of changing climate in many local African communities, while also embracing useful indigenous adaptive knowledge.

Climate literacy is extremely important for young people in Africa, especially as we seek to address the devastating impacts of climate change on human mobility in different parts of the continent. With relevant climate education, young people are well-informed on the adaptive strategies, able to hold the government accountable, and more importantly, drive informed policy climate policies that protect affected persons in frontline communities or on the move.



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How to acquire Climate Literacy


Formal Education: Schools are primary institutions to provide comprehensive climate education to young people. From primary level to secondary and tertiary levels, climate education is expected to be integrated into national curriculums, providing relevant insights to young people on the reality of climate change in their communities. If climate change is taught in classes at all levels, we are likely to significantly increase the level of climate literacy in the continent, which currently sits on the national average of 37%⁴⁷. Thus, young people need to take advantage of climate change taught in their classes to improve their understanding of climate realities in their local communities.

Reading, Deep research and Data: Young people seeking to meaningfully promote climate justice must be willing to read extensively to understand the reality of extreme weather events in various contexts. Through exploring different research documents – such as academic papers, policy briefs, UN reports, opinion articles – young people will become well-informed on the growing trends of climate realities, as well as identify sustainable solutions that fit their local context. Exploring relevant data will not only help young people understand the frequency and intensity of climate events in Africa, but it will also make them recognize the devastating impacts of climate disasters on vulnerable groups in frontline communities. 



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
