# Good Practices in NDC Update and Implementation: Challenges and Lessons Learned from Eastern and Southern Africa

## 1 and 2 September 2021

### **BACKGROUND**

Raising the global ambition of the nationally determined contributions (NDCs) and ensuring thorough implementation of the increased mitigation and adaptation targets are necessary to limit global warming to 1.5°C. Many countries have already enhanced the ambition of their NDC and submitted it to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) secretariat in 2020 and into 2021. In order to move quickly towards reducing global greenhouse gas emissions by 45% over the next decade and achieving global net-zero emissions in 2050, countries are now looking to formulate and execute their NDC implementation strategies, national adaptation plans, and other relevant national policies.

This virtual workshop aims to provide an avenue for countries from Sub-Saharan Africa to come together and share good practices and lessons learned from their NDC update process as well as provide a platform for peer-to-peer support. It will also provide an opportunity for countries to share challenges and good practices in the NDC implementation process and to identify areas for cooperation between countries and development partners. The workshop consists of presentations, panel discussions, and breakout sessions which cover cross-sectoral issues pertaining to NDC update and implementation.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

- 1. To share lessons learned during the 2020/21 NDC update process, increase clarity of updated and new NDCs, and recommendations for the 2025 NDC update process;
- 2. To share challenges and good practices in NDC implementation process;
- 3. To identify different financing mechanisms to allow countries to accelerate implementation of the update NDC commitments.

#### **TARGET PARTICIPANTS**

- 1. UNFCCC country focal points and NDC Partnership country focal points from the regions;
- 2. Representatives from government agencies (Ministries of Economy, Finance, National Planning, Environment/climate change and others) and non-governmental organizations relevant to NDC Implementation;
