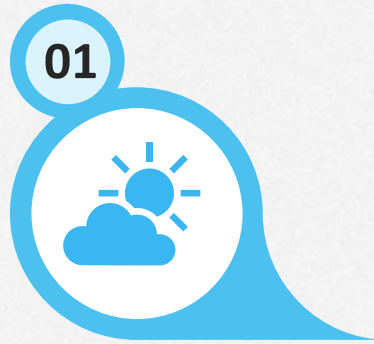

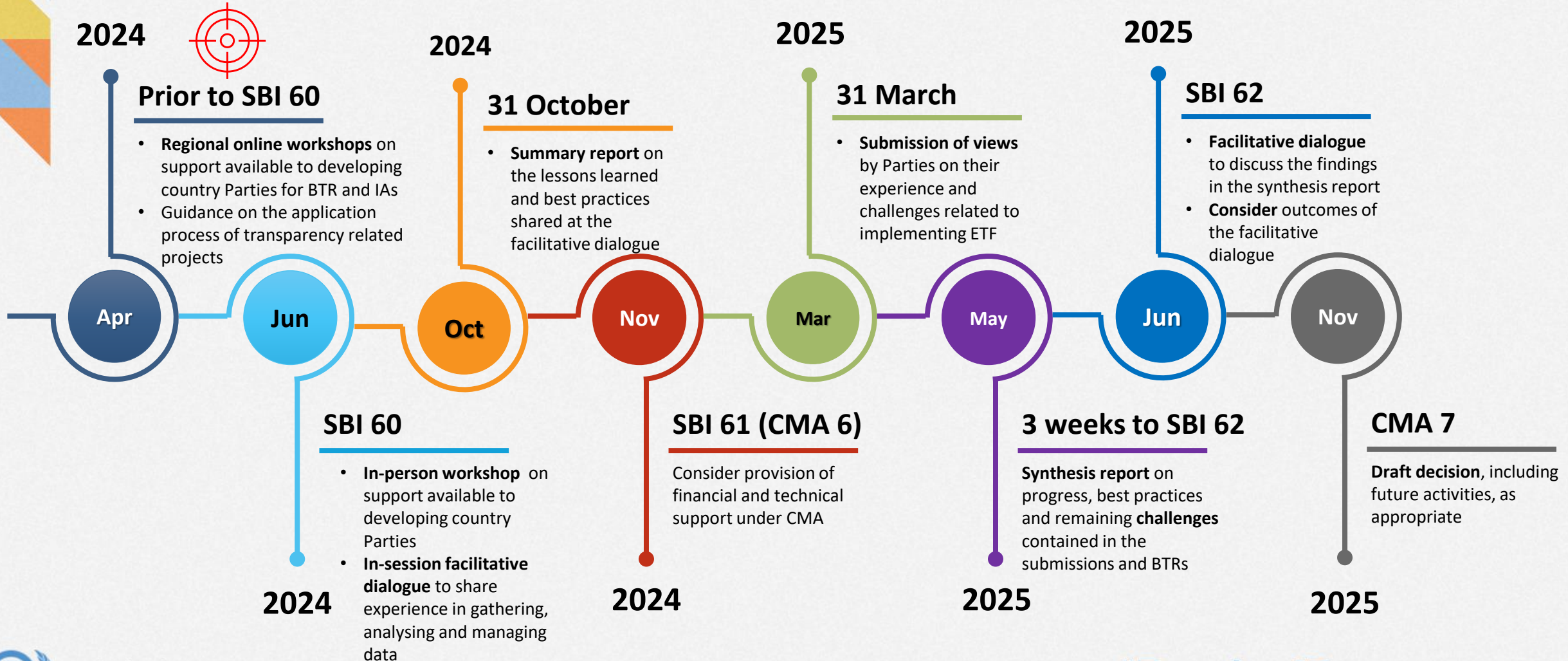

BTR and NC preparation

- 138 BTRs in 99 countries, totaling \$94.8M *
- \$145M available during GEF-8 (2022-2026)
- Modalities: stand-alone, combined BTR/NC, top-up



Capacity

Capacity-building Initiative for Transparency (CBIT)

- 96 projects in 88 countries, totaling \$159.6M *
- \$75M available during GEF-8
- Countries can request subsequent support

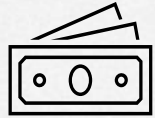

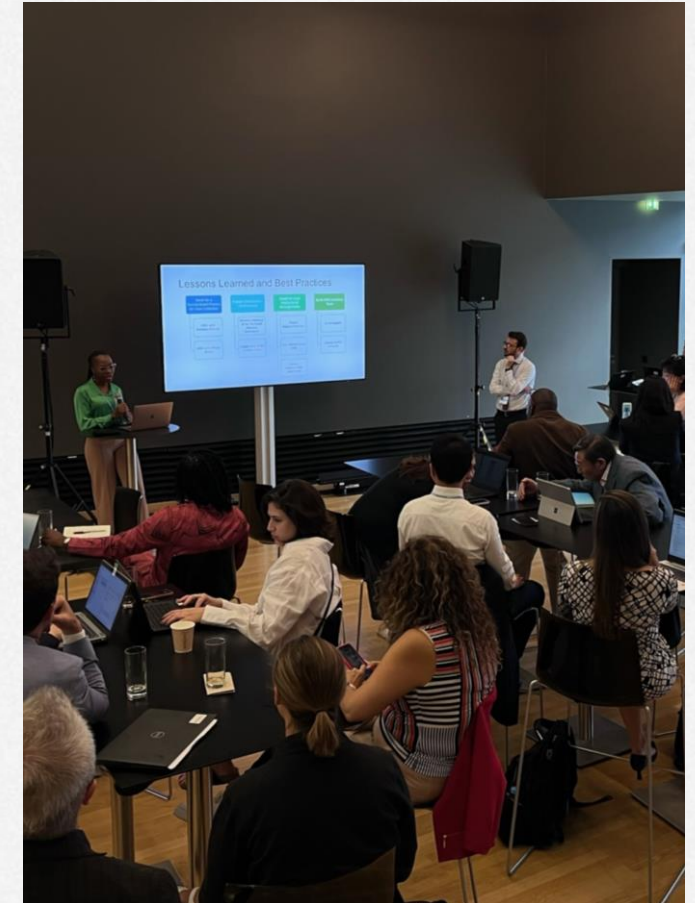
Bundled Reports. Countries can access two BTRs and one NC (as applicable) as part of the same EA project

Agriculture, food systems and climate change

COP28 emphasizes the transformative potential of agriculture in responding to climate change and ensuring global food security.

150 countries commit to **integrating agriculture and food systems into their climate action**. To do so, it is required:

- Political commitment
- Data and information
- Innovative solutions

How FAO supports counties to address Transparency?

1. Capacity Building Initiative for Transparency and Enabling Activity projects to support the capacity and the preparation of NCs and BTRs through GEF funding modalities
2. Facilitate the institutional set-up, definition of role and responsibilities
3. Technical training in GHG inventory (mainly AFOLU), 2006 IPCC Guidelines, IPCC Software, NDC tracking, NDC enhancement, adaptation reporting, BTR planning and implementation
4. Provide (bi)weekly remote technical advice in implementing tasks to speed up the preparation of the BTR, peer-review of the chapters, in particular on GHGI
5. Promote the involvement non-state actors (i.e. universities, research institutes) in the development of a strong and robust monitoring system.



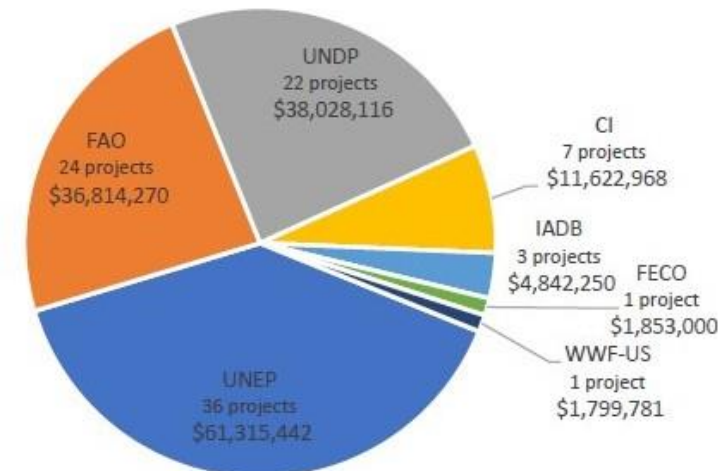
How FAO supports countries to address Transparency?

6. Develop tools, e-learnings, templates to facilitate the development of the BTR
7. Promote information exchange among FAO Global Forest Resources Assessment (FRA) national correspondents and UNFCCC national focal points (NFP) to guarantee the availability of the latest forest resource data for the BTRs
8. Support countries to strengthen institutional and technical capacities of developing countries on forest related data collection
9. Support and facilitate national forest inventory network to enhance forest data transparency.



Where does FAO address Transparency?

1. FAO is the second implementing agency of the GEF CBIT fund with **24 projects** (around 37 million USD\$) and few others in the pipeline
2. FAO global CBIT projects:
 - improving **data collection for forest** information (CBIT-Forest); and
 - enhancing technical **capacity in preparing the BTR**, with a focus on the agriculture, forestry and other land uses (CBIT-AFOLU)
3. FAO is also supporting **7 countries** accessing Enabling Activities funds for the BTR preparation.

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Key considerations and lessons learned



Considerations

- **Access to GEF resources:** ongoing basis, based on GEF eligibility criteria, GEF programming directions and available modalities, UNDP-GEF programming policies, including capacity assessment and selection of appropriate implementation modality.
- **Technical support:** ongoing basis, Lusophone and Francophone network countries prioritized, other countries supported based on availability, considering commitment and ambition of the Government, as reflected in the NDCs, quick assessment of delivery risks/lack of ongoing bilateral and multilateral portfolio in the UNDP CO and Govt, alignment with country priorities, synergies and no duplication with other support.



Good Practices

- **Early request, regular communication and proper understanding of UNDP-GEF policies and requirements** for programming are key for timely access to GEF resources.
- Use of **Bundled (2 BTRs + 1 NC) modality to avoid gap** between reporting and sustain capacity/teams.
- **CBIT portfolio to enhance capacities for ETF and complement reporting** with robust Institutional arrangements and NDC tracking systems.
- Align **BTR with NDC revision cycle.**
- Through technical support, countries are **unlocking bottlenecks in accessing GEF funds and implementing NCs, BTRs, BUR projects**
- Through technical support on **the GHG Inventories, quality reviews of BURs, NIR, REDD+ Annex, support in responding to the comments and recommendations** in TA/ICA and TER/FMCPs, countries unlock and submit their reports without further delays.
- Through in-country technical trainings, **countries establish national expertise, and the trained experts multiply trainings at national and local level.**
- Through technical support to climate negotiators for SBs and COPs, developing **countries become more vocal and empowered in representing their priorities at country and regional level**



Key considerations and lessons learned



Key lessons in [Enhancing climate change transparency](#)

1. The common **strengthening and use of information** leads to quality and efficiency.
2. The **ability to sustain qualified national human capacity** plays a significant role in the magnitude of enhanced transparency that is achieved.
3. **Regional programs and networks** make a difference when it comes to enhanced transparency outcomes.
4. **Digital systems and tools** are significantly increasing efficiency and their use is growing.
5. **Collaboration and coordination of activities save resources** that can be used for greater transparency enhancement.
6. **Collaboration among national stakeholders** allows for continued capacity.
7. **Knowledge sharing** is paying dividends.
8. **International knowledge** and skills are still needed to advance enhanced transparency.
9. **Gender and youth inclusion** drives enhanced transparency and climate action.
10. Interoperable **capacity-building** increases the quality and efficiency of enhanced transparency.

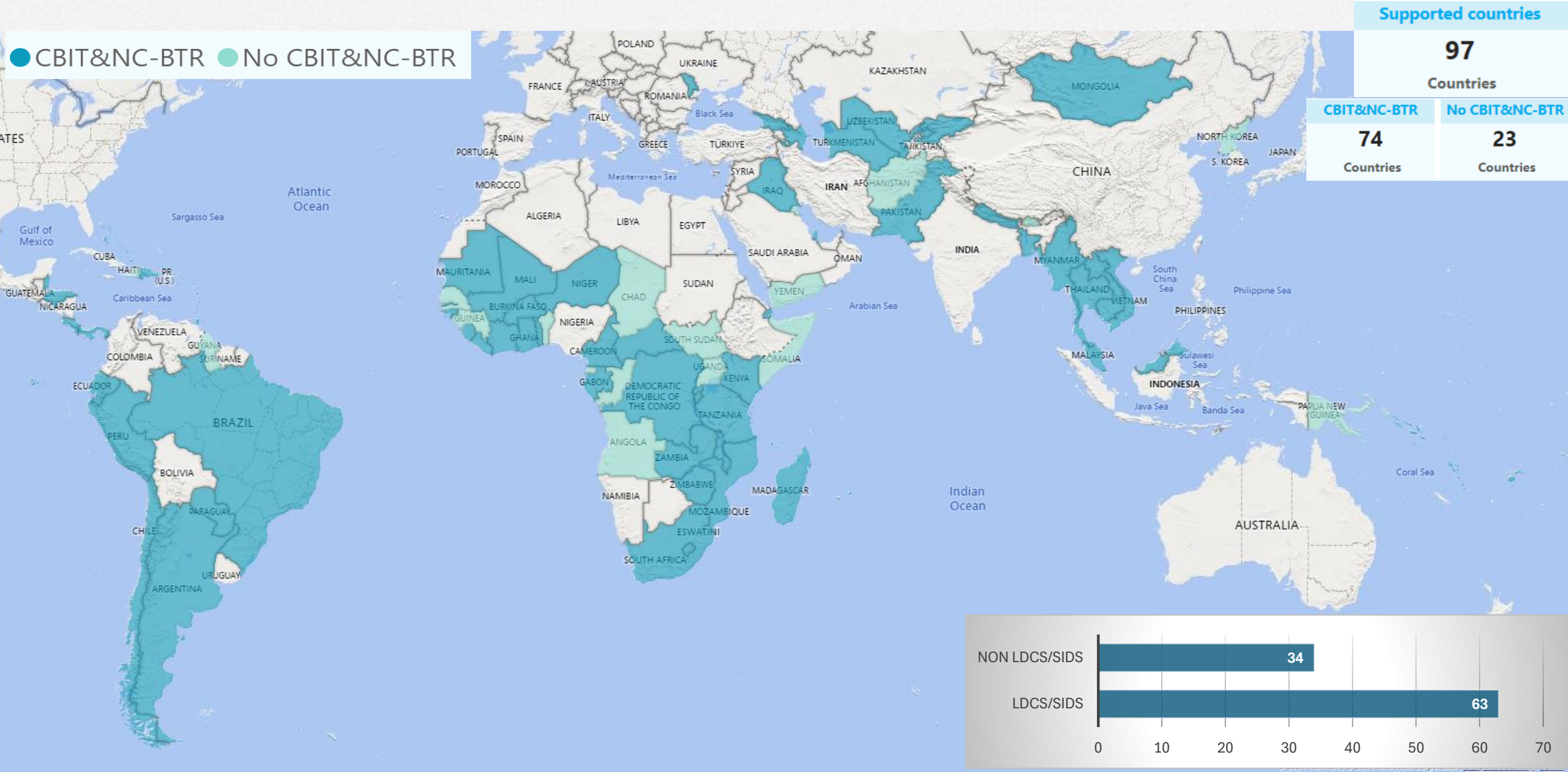

Key considerations and lessons learned

GEF Funding Request and Approval Process

- ❑ Diverse country needs/circumstances. UNEP adopts diff. approaches. E.g. on BTRs funding modalities; - Bundled/Top-ups, BTRs, NC/BTR combined etc
- ❑ No Project Preparation Grants for Enabling Activities. Countries encouraged to set-aside some funds to support the dev. of subsequent project proposals
- ❑ Eliminating potential funding gaps btwn reports. (Submission of reports to the UNFCCC&GEF funding approval). UNEP appreciates the flexibility granted by the GEF in a previous submission
- ❑ Enabling Activities - Administratively heavy portfolio for IAs –(smaller projects, IA Fee). Ongoing discussions with GEF.

UNEP's Processes: - From Project Concept & Planning

- ❑ Simplified processes/templates (internal proposal reviews/project plans
- ❑ Increase in No. of UNEP personnel to support different Regions/language preference
- ❑ Govt/personnel changes. Continuous training and support to establish climate coordination Units/CBIT

National Govt. Project implementation to submission to UNFCCC

- ❑ Strengthen complementary of Reporting & CBIT and other ETF Initiatives
- ❑ Active participation in Regional networks/peer exchange - through GSP/CBIT/UNFCCC
- ❑ Actively seek and participate in relevant trainings organized by various partners, using project funds
- ❑ **Political involvement, goodwill, endorsement and update of outputs**

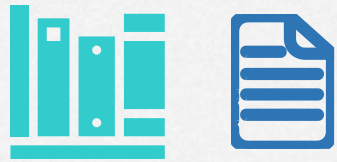

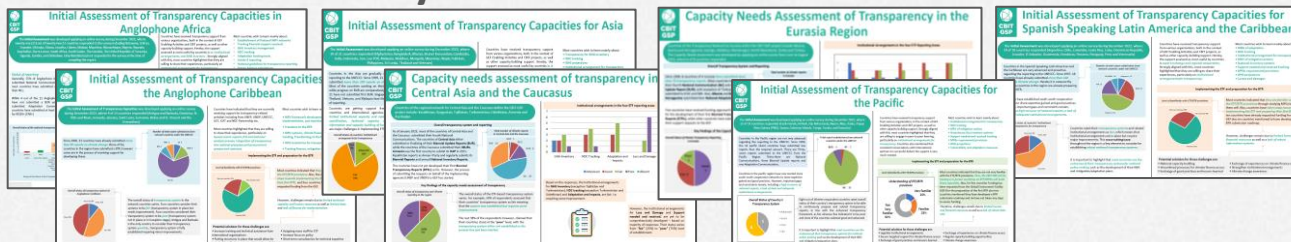

- Implementation of activities, both at regional and national activities, according to work plan and incoming support requests by countries

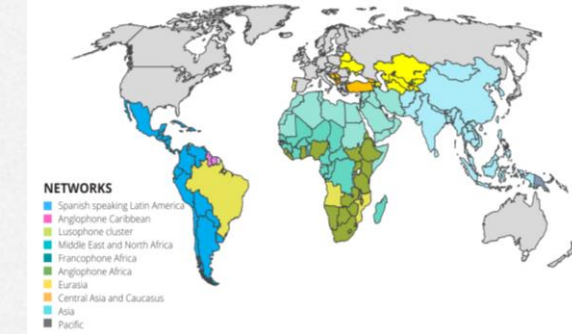

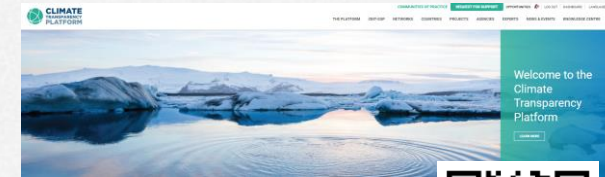

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Key considerations and lessons learned

- **Availability and retention of human resources** identified as a major challenge.
- **Significant support** is required to understand and implement **ETF requirements for BTR** in 2024, including use of CTF tables for GHG inventories and NDC Tracking.
- Foundational challenges in **institutional arrangements** for consistent **data collection** remain a priority
- Majority of **countries have BTR plans underway**, but meeting submission deadlines remains highly challenging
- **Specifically tailored** support provided to each country is of crucial importance for meeting their specific needs in transparency. Support was based on priorities identified in the **capacity needs assessment** and further discussions with countries
- The **exchange of experience between the countries and networks** on their best practices on ETF was recognized as one of the best approaches in learning.
- **Practicality of the training** and ability to use domestic data in CTFs and CRTs was important to overcome stress in filling in the new required tables under the ETF/BTR.
- **Communication in network languages** and access to the materials/information in relevant languages.
- **Mentoring and high quality of the international experts** was recognized as an asset to learning sessions on NDC tracking in particular.
- **Collaboration with other transparency partners and complementarity of the efforts** on climate transparency added value to the trainings and helped to extend the agenda on some topics (e.g. GHG Inventory vs NDC Tracking).
- **Climate Transparency Platform** helped disseminate the events' materials and served as an entry point for accessing them.

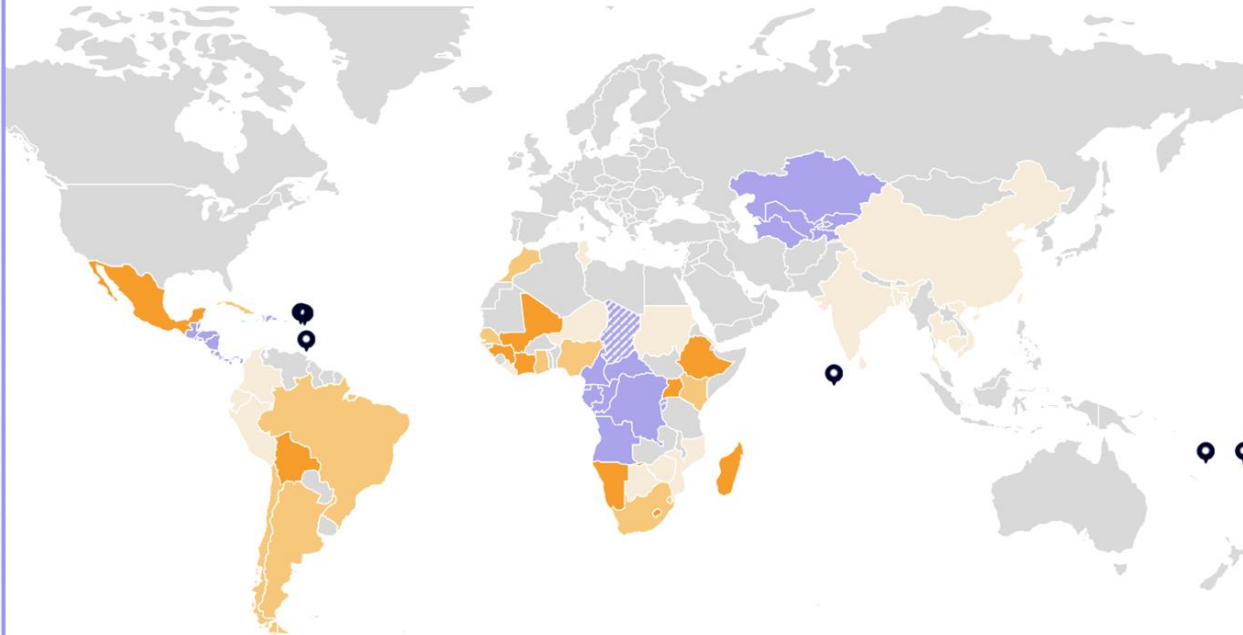

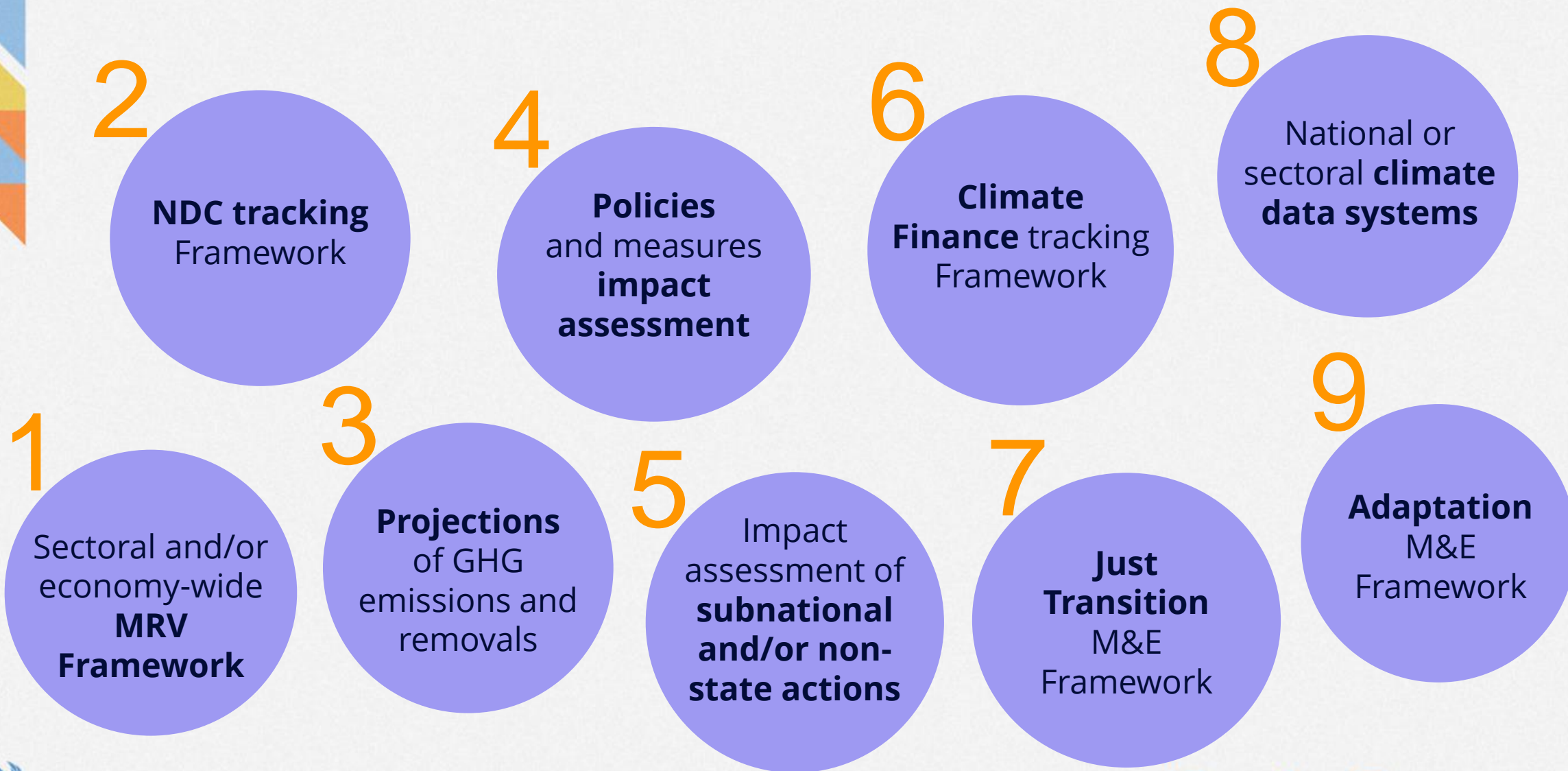

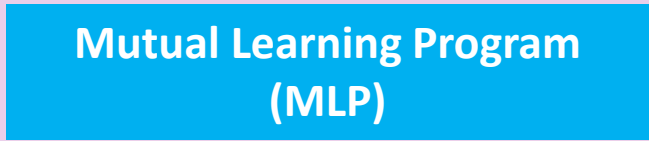

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Overview of supports provided by Japan

- Workshop on Greenhouse Gas Inventories in Asia (WGIA)
 - ◆ Workshop to assist countries in Asia in improving the quality of their greenhouse gas inventories and building capacity for inventory preparation
- Mutual Learning Program (MLP)
 - ◆ Peer-to-peer learning activity to improve and deepen the understanding of the preparation of future biennial transparency reports (BTRs)
- Support initiative on GHG inventories in BTR
 - ◆ Support for developing countries to strengthen their reporting capacities for the preparation of GHG inventories, including strengthening institutional arrangements, developing methodologies, etc.
- Promote the implementation of the Paris Agreement
 - ◆ Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) supports central and local governments by strengthening their technical capacity to develop and/or update, implement and monitor their climate change policies and strategies, and to prepare BTRs.



Key considerations and lessons learned

- Country-driven exercise
 - ◆ Considering the lessons learned from Japan's transparency support to developing countries, it is effective to have mutual learning among developing countries or to have experts from developing countries work with Japanese experts to prepare GHG inventories and provide technical support.
- Expanding target countries and themes
 - ◆ Recognizing that developing countries face various challenges in implementing the ETF and need technical support, the target countries and themes of supports have been expanded.
 - ◆ WGIA has strengthened the network of government officials, researchers, and inventory experts/compiler in Asia and enhanced regional knowledge exchange since 2003.
- Project duration
 - ◆ Capacity building takes time, and it is essential to continuously enhance capacities from a medium- to long-term perspective.
 - ◆ The MLP, a one-year program, continuously supports countries several times.
 - ◆ The Support Initiative on GHG inventories, MOEJ's newly started transparency-related support, provides in-depth support to strengthen reporting capacities for the preparation of GHG inventories. The project duration is one year, but can be extended until the reporting capacity is fully developed.

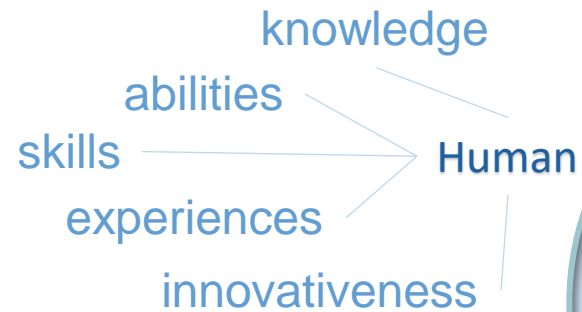

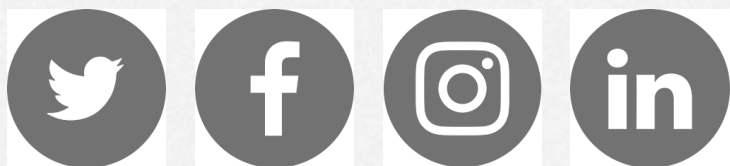
