GLOBAL CLIMATE ASSEMBLY FOR CLIMATE JUSTICE PARTICIPATORY CLIMATE GOVERNANCE FROM THE FRONTLINES

BACKGROUND

Current global climate governance remains deeply unequal. Those most impacted by the climate crisis—frontline communities, Indigenous Peoples, women, youth, and environmental defenders-are systematically marginalized from decision-making processes. Existing participation frameworks, including under Action for Climate Empowerment (ACE), remain fragmented and largely inaccessible. The Global Climate Assembly (GCA) emerges in response. It is a locally-rooted, regionally-coordinated, globally-presented process, led by local and frontline communities and environmental defenders. GCA moves beyond calls for inclusion, focusing on reshaping the very content of negotiations: just transition, loss and damage, reparations, adaptation, rights, and finance.

OBJECTIVES

- Empower communities and defenders to define climate justice priorities through local deliberations.
- Channel local mandates to regional and global levels to influence multilateral negotiations.
- Produce a People's Declaration on Climate Justice to guide outcomes at COP30 and beyond.
- Develop a model for replicable, community-led participation within global climate governance.

It is not a consultation, but a political intervention designed to embed justice, reparations, and rights into multilateral climate processes. At COP30 and beyond, the GCA will not just ask for a seat at the table; it will bring the table and set the agenda.
