Dialogue on “Connecting Stakeholders, Resources, Processes and Mechanisms for a Systemic Approach to Climate Action”

31 July 2025

JOINT STATEMENT OF THE COP PRESIDENCIES TROIKA

We, the COP Presidencies Troika - comprising the United Arab Emirates, Azerbaijan, and Brazil - convened Parties and a wide variety of stakeholders in Bonn on the sidelines of the 62nd sessions of the UNFCCC subsidiary bodies (SB62) to advance the mandate of the Road Map to Mission 1.5 set out under the outcome of the first Global Stocktake and highlight the power of inclusive, action-oriented multilateralism in driving and delivering collective action. Through this dialogue, we reaffirmed our shared commitment to connect the climate process with concrete implementation, and to keep 1.5°C within reach through a whole of government, whole of society approach.

10 years into the implementation of the Paris Agreement and 30 years into the work under the Convention, results are still overdue in marking an inflection point in the rise in global temperature and be on track in the fight against climate change. 2025 must be the year where the credibility of multilateralism is tested and global climate ambition is translated into delivery, beyond negotiations and into implementation.

COP30 in Belém is a decisive moment when multilateral cooperation must yield meaningful, measurable outcomes for people’s lives across all pillars of the Paris Agreement. We stress the urgent and undeferrable need for Parties to turn commitments into concrete actions by submitting and implementing their nationally determined contributions (NDCs), national adaptation plans (NAPs), biannual transparency reports (BTRs) to guide the decisions and outcomes at COP30.

We call on all Parties to submit economy-wide 2035 NDCs by 30 September 2025, that represent a progression beyond their previous efforts and are informed by the outcomes of the first Global Stocktake and the 1.5°C goal. These NDCs must serve as credible roadmaps - grounded in national development priorities, capabilities and circumstances, be fully implementable, and supported by strengthened institutions and policy frameworks at all government levels, sending a clear signal to the markets to put in place the necessary enablers to deliver this transformation. Timely submission of the next NDCs is the strongest signal the international community can send in support of multilateralism, climate action, and sustainable development.

We reaffirm the UAE Consensus and the Baku Climate Unity Pact as foundations for accelerated implementation of climate action across all pillars - mitigation, adaptation, loss and damage and means of implementation and support. We stress the need to increase accessibility, availability and affordability of funding at scale - particularly for developing countries and those most vulnerable to climate impacts -

and to ensure rapid deployment of support under the Fund for responding to loss and damage. We also underscore the imperative of aligning international financial flows with low-emission, climate-resilient development, alongside the need for structural adjustments in global financial and governance systems to accelerate the implementation of the Paris Agreement both within and beyond the UNFCCC.

We support the leadership of the incoming COP30 Presidency - Brazil - as it is building momentum through the Global Mutirão - a call for planetary mobilization and collective climate action across all fronts of COP30 - negotiations, Action Agenda, Leaders' Summit, and public mobilization. Rooted in the outcomes of the first Global Stocktake, the COP30 Action Agenda will serve as a live repository of climate solutions, designed to catalyze a giant leap in sustainable development by connecting national climate plans to finance, technology, and capacity-building.

We invite all Parties and stakeholders to contribute concrete solutions that accelerate whole-of-government, whole-of-economy, and whole-of-society action, ensuring ambition is matched by delivery across all pillars of the Paris Agreement. The Southern Cross vision will guide this transition - ensuring that ambition is matched by delivery across mitigation, adaptation, finance, technology, and capacity-building. The operationalization of the Southern Cross as both a governance constellation and a web of multilateral collaboration can be a key driver in this endeavor. By connecting NDCs, BTRs, and NAPs to country-platforms, long-term development strategies, and dedicated climate units, supported by Digital Public Infrastructure, it has the potential to align stakeholders, resources, processes, and mechanisms for systemic, impactful implementation.

The Roadmap to Mission 1.5 COP Presidencies Troika underscores the importance of integrating the climate and development agendas ensuring that climate action supports broader socioeconomic transformation and countries' prosperity. Strengthening subnational action and enhancing solidarity with the most vulnerable are essential to ensure no one is left behind in the transition. This spirit must guide the implementation of the Road Map to Mission 1.5.

We recognize that a just, inclusive transition must promote prosperity, dignity, resilience, and opportunity for all. Stakeholder engagement - particularly with Indigenous Peoples and traditional communities, women, youth, workers, and marginalized social groups - is essential to ensure climate action is equitable and transformative.

We are committed to working through multilateral cooperation to build a sustainable, equitable, and resilient future. Let COP 30 in Belém mark the moment when the commitments become a reality - where the world comes together to turn ambition into collective, systemic delivery.
