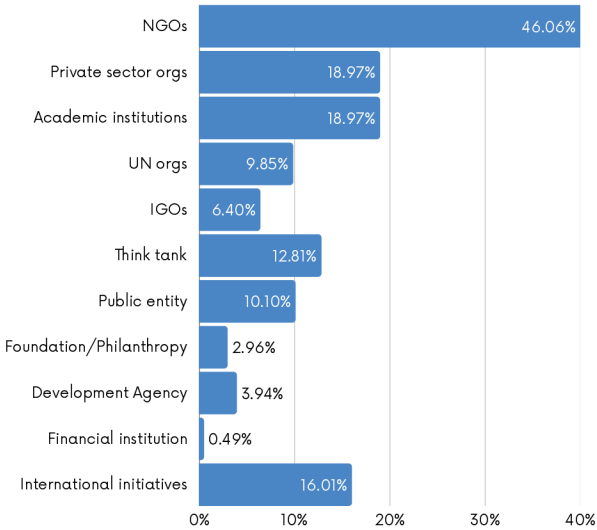
PCCB NETWORK MEMBERS "IN A NUTSHELL"

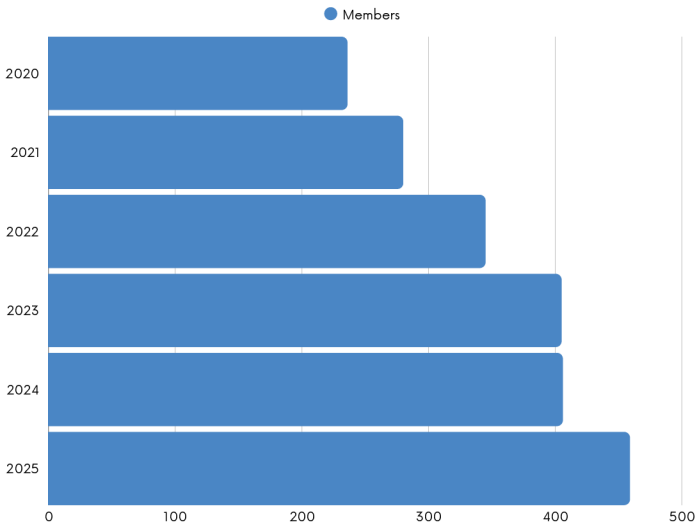
Regional Distribution

The PCCB Network members represent regions across the globe with organizations from Western Europe (25.81%), Africa (21.84%), Asia-Pacific (19.60%), North America (11.17%), Latin America & the Caribbean (10.42%), Middle East and North Africa (6.95%), global organizations (2.23%) and Eastern Europe (1.99%).

Distribution by Type of Institution



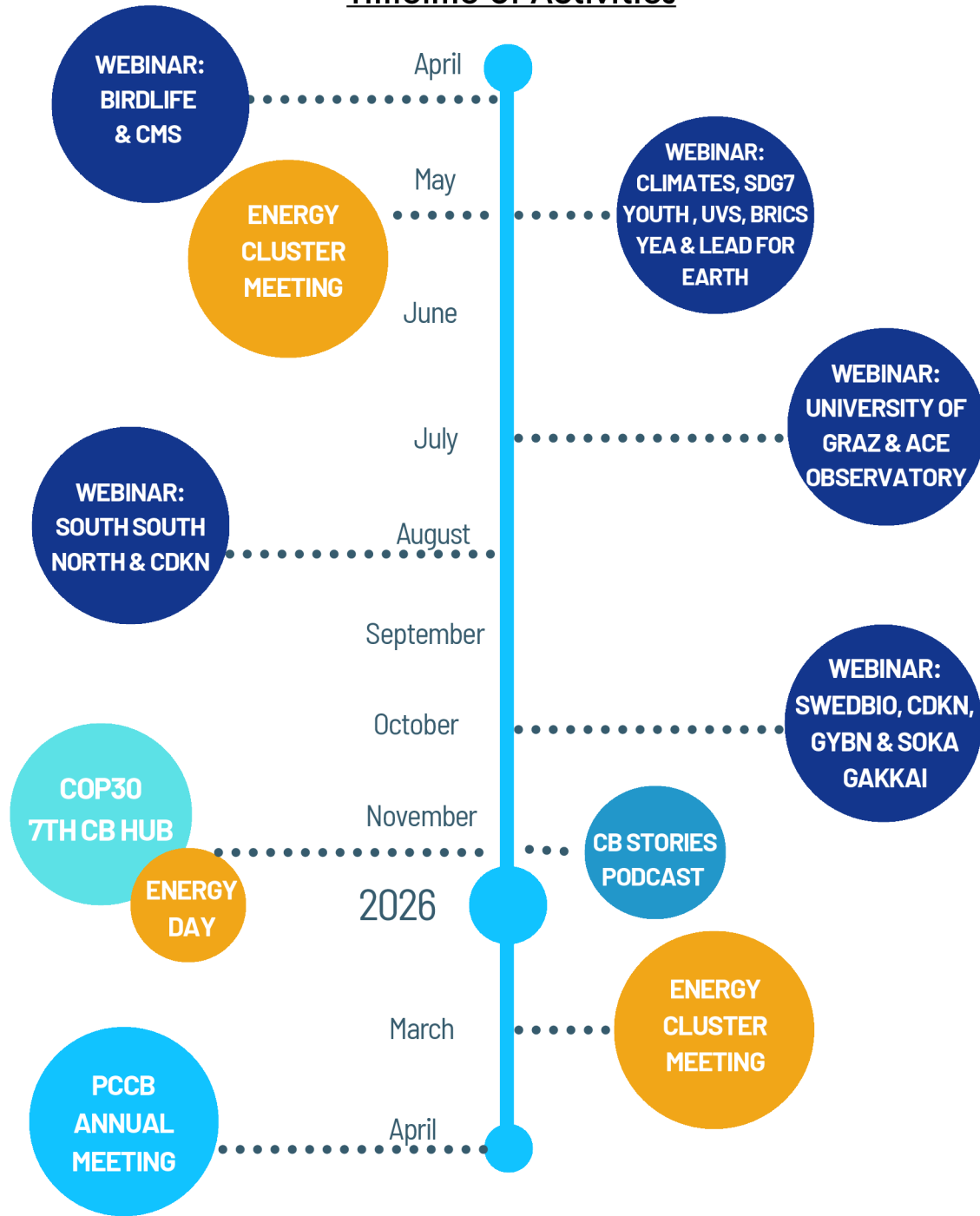
Growth in the PCCB Network

Capacity-building Podcasts

[The CB Stories Podcast Climate Action 101 Series](#) produced under the PCCB Network and in collaboration with UNU, consisted of five episodes released prior to the Capacity-building Hub. Each episode provided a 101-level introduction to the topics of the thematic days by identifying the key capacity-building gaps and needs and exploring practical approaches and solution pathways to address them. The episode guests included partner organizations who provided expert insights and context for each topic.

The podcast has since evolved into a talk-show-style video format with [The CB Friends Daily Show](#), also in partnership with UNU launched at COP30. This new format unpacks key topics shaping climate action and capacity-building, featuring voices from PCCB Network members.

3.4 Engagement & Networking

6th Annual Meeting of the PCCB Network

In April 2025, the 6th Annual Meeting of the PCCB Network provided members an online space to network, share experiences, and strengthen collaboration. Together, members mapped a path toward greater impact and engagement in 2025 and beyond.

PCCB Network App

The annual meeting also announced the launch of the PCCB Network App which provides a filterable database for members to connect with other specific members. The Energy Cluster also has a dedicated space on the app.

PCCB Network(ing) for Radical Collaboration at SB62

The first in-person convening of members of the PCCB Network took place at SB62 to open the 9th meeting of the PCCB. PCCB Members and PCCB Network members had the chance to reimagine collaboration within the Network through inclusive dialogue and collective action.

7th Capacity-building Hub

Hosted by the PCCB every year in the margins of COP, the 7th Capacity-building Hub took place over the course of six thematic days from 12 to 20 November 2025 at COP30 in Belem, Brazil with participation of 80% from members of the Network.
