Concept note

Capacity-building to support the implementation of Enhanced Transparency Framework under the Paris Agreement – ensuring coherence and coordination of actions and support

Background

The Durban Forum on capacity-building was established in 2011 under the SBI to further enhance the monitoring and review of the effectiveness of capacity-building under the Convention.¹ It is an in-session discussion platform for Parties, representatives of the constituted bodies under the Convention, and relevant experts and practitioners to, on an annual basis and in the context of specific thematic areas, share experience and exchange ideas, best practices and lessons learned in relation to implementing capacity-building activities.

COP 24 requested the SBI to thematically align meetings of the Durban Forum with the annual focus area of the PCCB.² Thus, the outcomes of the 9th Durban Forum are expected to be fed directly into the work of the PCCB as per its rolling workplan for 2017–2019,³ which was extended to the end of 2020 at COP 25.⁴ The 2020 focus area of the PCCB is strengthening coherence and coordination of capacity-building activities for implementing NDCs.⁵

Discussions at the 9th Durban Forum will build on discussions at previous Forums on capacity-building in developing countries in relation to NDCs. The focus of the 8th Durban Forum was on strengthening institutions at the national level to support capacity-building activities for implementing NDCs in developing countries, and the focus of the 7th Forum was on enhancing capacity for implementing NDCs in the context of the Paris Agreement. Discussions will also build on those held at the 2nd Capacity-building Hub in the context of Transparency Day.⁶ The Capacity-building Hub is the result of Parties and non-Party stakeholders recommending the establishment of an in-session space for formal and informal knowledge exchange on capacity-building related matters, sharing relevant case studies, success stories and lessons learned, and discussing how best to support capacity-building action.

Transparency is key to meeting the goals of the Paris Agreement and will be achieved through the enhanced transparency framework established under Article 13 of the Paris Agreement. The main purpose of the enhanced transparency framework is to foster a clear understanding of climate change action, including progress towards achieving NDCs under Article 4 and implementing adaptation action under Article 7 of the Paris Agreement, as well as support provided and received by Parties. The enhanced transparency framework builds on and enhances existing MRV arrangements under the Convention. Some domestic MRV systems can already serve as a foundation for implementing the enhanced transparency framework; but it is clear that the domestic MRV systems of most developing countries will require enhancement in terms of institutional, technical and systemic capacity. Increased capacity for transparency will allow developing countries to better align and integrate climate action into their national development plans and strategies, support them in identifying their technology, finance and capacity-building gaps and needs and understanding the effectiveness of action taken, and help them in mobilizing additional financial resources.
