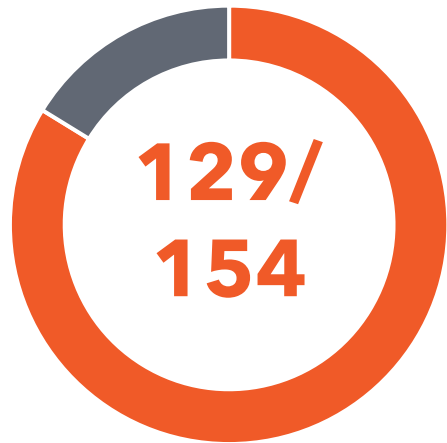

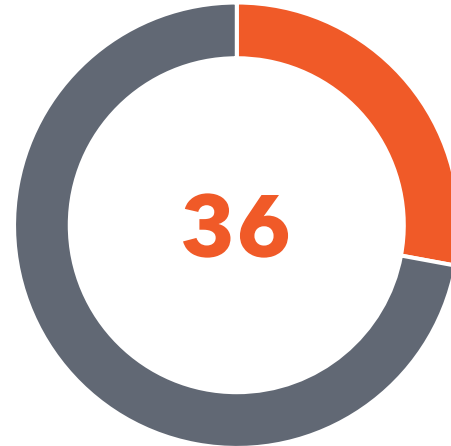

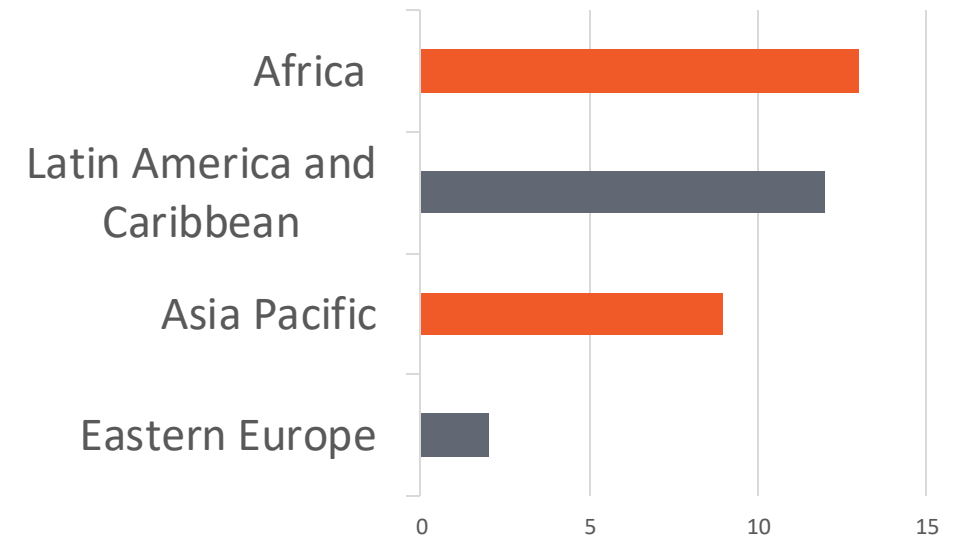
National Adaptation Planning

underway

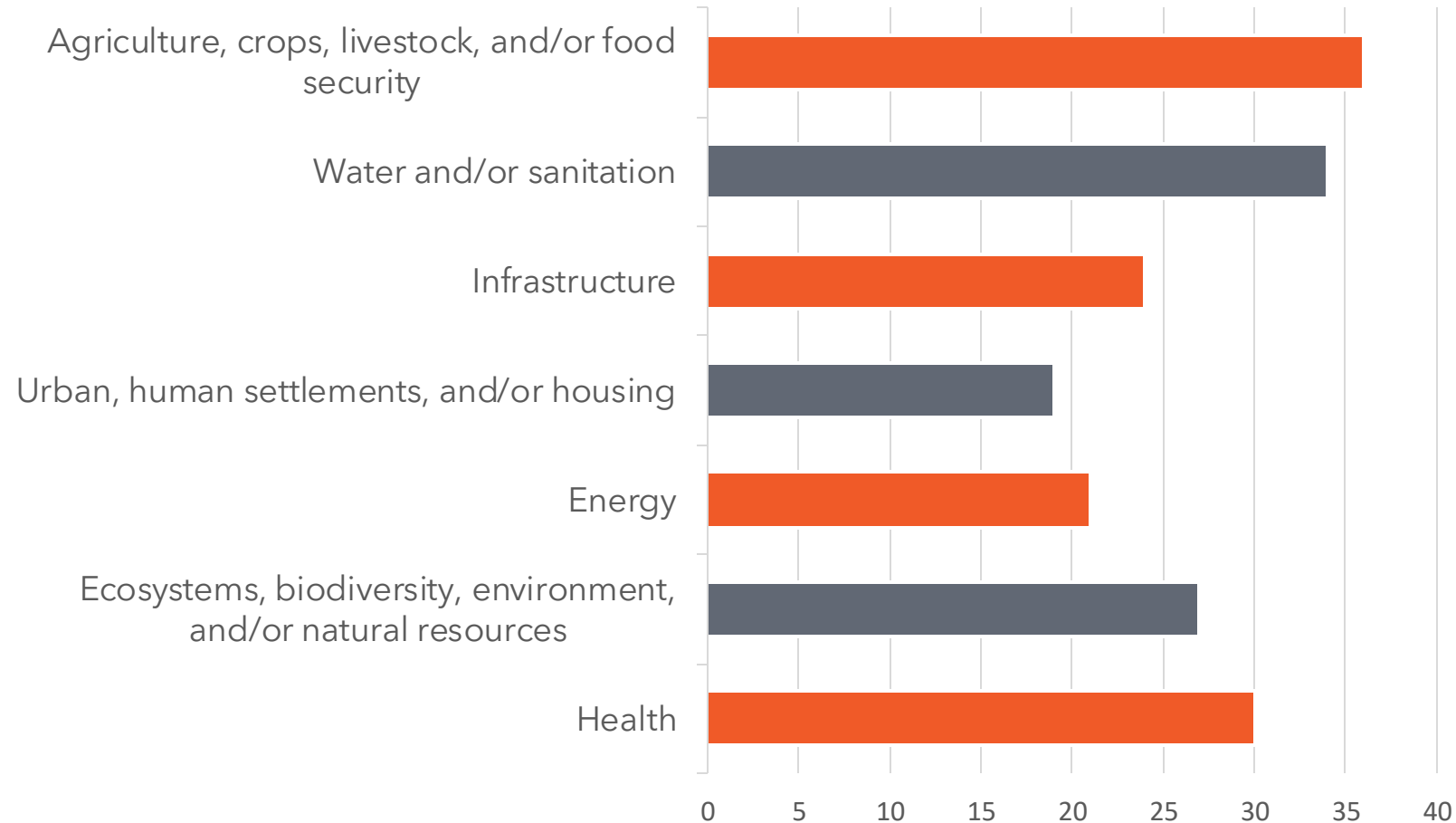


NAP documents

vs.

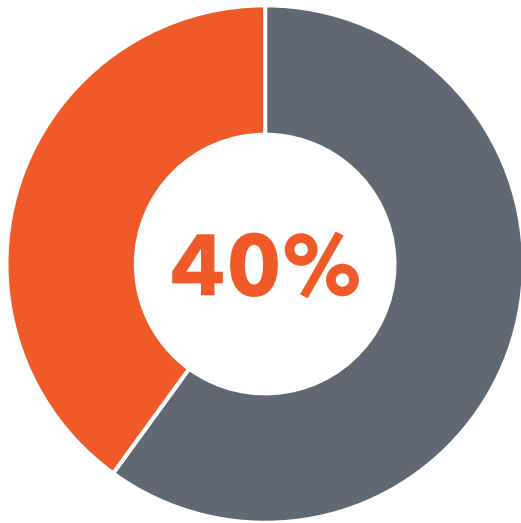

Planning to implementation

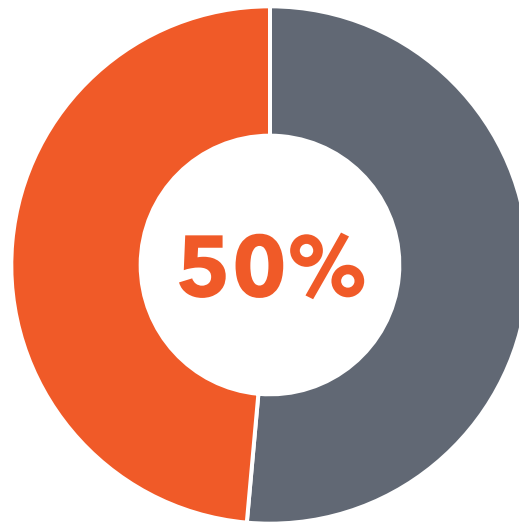


- Some NAPs include information re implementation
 - Implementation plans (10%), costing (40%), financing chapters and strategies
- But this is limiting – involves much more, e.g.,
 - Communications, outreach – translating and socializing the NAP
 - Mainstreaming into core development plans and processes
 - Project preparation, design
- Capacities and costs for transition

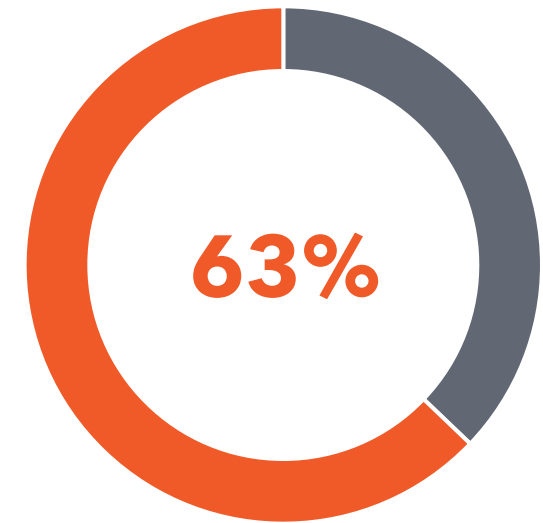

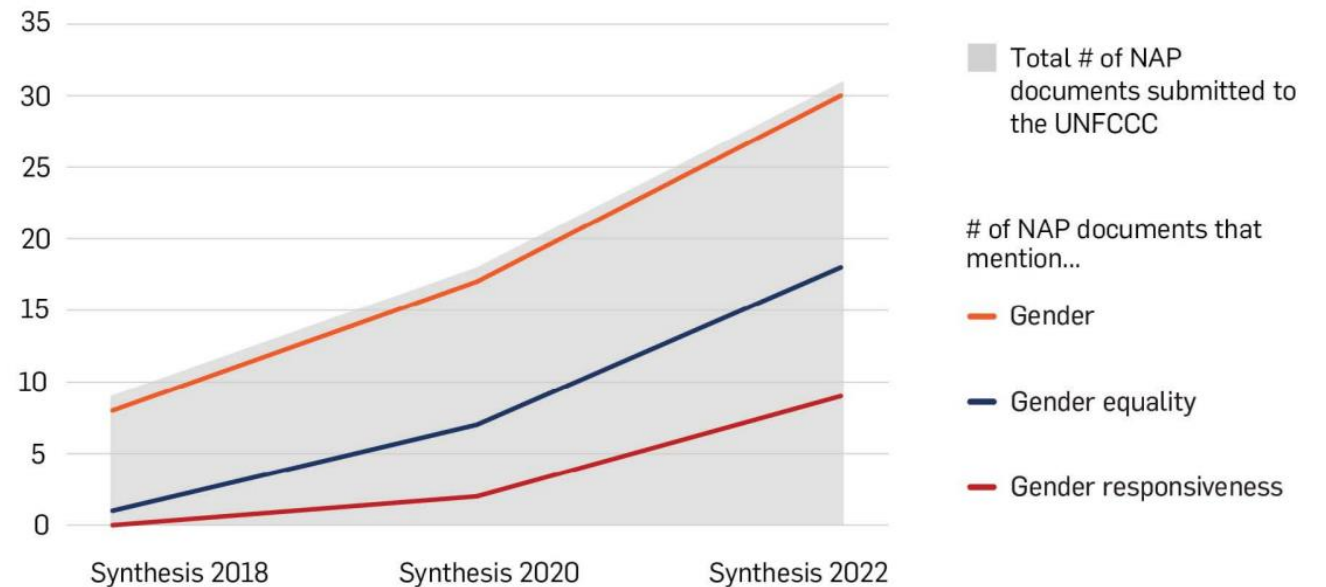

Gender equality and social inclusion

- Greater acknowledgement of **gender responsiveness**
- More openings for **intersectional** approach (human rights, empowerment)
- More NAPs position women as **agents of change**
- **Institutional arrangements** for coordination and implementation

Institutionalizing adaptation

- 1) Cross-government coordination and collaboration**
 - Inter-Ministerial Steering Committees, National Commissions, MOUs
 - Keeping these structures alive after the Plan is done?
- 2) Links between national and subnational, national and regional**
 - Regionalization of NAP; sharing framework locally; IVA
 - Could NAPs be instruments for enhancing international cooperation?
- 3) Mainstreaming for climate resilient development**
 - Mainstream NAP into sub-national planning – basis for budgets
 - Legislation and resourcing gap
