### **CARE International No Climate Justice Without Gender Justice Concept Note**

#### **Background:**

CARE International is a global confederation working together in over 100 countries to overcome poverty and social injustice. CARE International has run climate projects since 2002 and has gained a unique expertise in topics such as climate-resilient agriculture, gender-transformative adaptation, adaptation planning and vulnerability analysis, renewable energy and climate advocacy at local, regional, national and international level.

As part of CARE's Vision 2030, CARE aims to strengthen the resilience and adaptive capacities for 25 million poor and marginalized people, especially girls and young women who are disproportionately vulnerable to the effects of climate change. CARE recognizes the important role of women and youth, particularly girls and young women, as agents of change as they are on the frontline when it comes to combating climate change.

This 'No Climate Justice Without Gender Justice' session will cover why Gender Justice is crucial to building climate resilience for all and present best practice with regards to moving from Gender-Sensitive to Gender Transformative Adaptation by presenting lessons learnt from using CARE's CVCA tool and Case study. It will cover what activities are needed to integrate in Community-based Adaptation programs/projects to make them gender-sensitive or transformative and finally summarize key gender actions to consider in adaptation projects and programs.

#### **Objectives:**

By the end of the session participants will be able to:

- Clearly explain the linkages between gender inequalities and climate change in terms of differentiated impacts;
- Better understand how to integrate gender into locally led adaptation programming.

### **PART I: Why Gender Justice is crucial to building climate resilience for all?**

1. Quiz: 4 questions covering why gender and climate justice are related: differential vulnerabilities /Capacities (conducted through <https://quizizz.com/>) followed by quick answer explanations.

### **PART 2: From Gender-Sensitive to Gender Transformative Adaptation**

*(35 minutes)*

1. Discussion: What activities do you need to integrate in CBA programs/projects to make them gender-sensitive or transformative? + CARE’s Gender Equality Framework (10 mins)
2. Case study and CARE CVCA tool lessons learnt presentation followed with Q&A (20 mins)
3. Quick Summary of what to integrate for gender transformative climate adaptation programmes (5 mins)

1. Sharing one thing remembered or one action to take on after this session
2. Closing words
