TEP (technical examination process)	
TEP-A	<p>1/CP.21 para 126 requests the AC to conduct TEP-As from 2016 to 2020 (jointly organised by SBI and SBSTA and supported by the secretariat).</p> <p>TEP-A consist of technical expert meetings (TEMs), technical papers and summaries for policy-makers (SPMs). SPMs are prepared based on TEMs. The SPMs feed into the annual high-level event that builds on the Lima-Paris Action Agenda and will be held in conjunction with the COP until 2020. It is not clear if the TEP-A will continue after 2020.</p> <p>A review of the TEP-A (also mandated through 1/CP.21) was carried out in 2017.</p> <p>How are topics of the TEP-A defined: Report of the AC “The 2019 TEP-A will focus on adaptation finance, including the private sector. AC 14 requested the TEP-A working group and the secretariat to produce a concept note for discussion by early January 2019, to develop a prioritized list of topics for the final 2020 TEP-A and to report back at AC 15 on progress” The TEP-A working group = includes AC members, and representatives from the LEG, TEC, SCF, and the BINGO, RINGO, and ENGO constituencies</p> <p>The 2020 TEP-A is taking place on the topic of Education and training, public participation and youth to enhance adaptation action.</p>
TEP-M	<p>Decision 1/CP.21 requested the secretariat to organise the technical examination process on mitigation and disseminate its results</p> <p>The Marrakech Partnership for Global Climate Action, led by two high-level Climate Champions, brings together Party and non-Party stakeholders to enhance collaboration, catalyze the scaling up of efforts and allow for a political showcasing of adaptation and mitigation successes, including those identified through the TEPs.</p> <p>How are topic of the TEP-M defined: “Decision 13/CP.23 3. Also strongly urges the high-level champions to identify, by 12 January 2018, in consultation with the Technology Executive Committee and the Climate Technology Centre and Network, topics for the technical examination process on mitigation for the period until 2020;” Website” As requested by the Conference of the Parties, at its twenty-third session, the high-level champions identified, in consultation with the Technology Executive Committee and the <u>Technology Executive Committee</u> and the <u>Climate Technology Centre and Network</u>, topics for the technical examination process on mitigation (TEP-M) for the period until 2020”</p>

Technical expert group meetings (TEMs) (are part of TEPs)	<p>technical expert meetings bringing together a broad group of expert stakeholders to discuss policies, action, concrete opportunities and implementation.</p> <p>They can be held in conjunction with meetings but also at the regional level.</p>
TEC	<p>The TEC adopted a general approach on the integration of gender in their work that was included in a concept note on this topic. TEC/2019/19/10</p>
CTCN Advisory Board	<p>The CTCN Advisory Board introduced guidance developed in collaboration with the UNEP DTU Partnership for national teams on integrating gender considerations into the technology needs assessment process, which is currently used by all 22 countries going through the technology needs assessment process.</p> <p>The CTCN has a gender policy in place.</p> <p>At the capacity building members expressed interest in the CTCN continuing and further strengthening its work on gender.</p>
ACE (Action for Climate Empowerment)	
Dialogues on Action for Climate Empowerment	<p>COP 18 adopted the Doha work programme on Article 6 of the Convention and requested the SBI to organize an annual in-session Dialogue to enhance work in this area.</p> <p>The COP decided that the dialogue will cluster the six elements of Article 6 of the Convention (education, training, public awareness, public participation, public access to information and international cooperation) into two focal areas: education and training, and public access to information, public participation and public awareness. International cooperation is a cross-cutting theme of both focal areas.</p> <p>The Dialogues provide a regular forum to Parties and other stakeholders to share their experiences, exchange ideas, good practices and lessons learned regarding the implementation of Article 6 of the Convention.</p>
Agriculture	
Koronivia workprogramme	<p>The Koronivia road map provides a timeline of the in-session workshops (organized by the Secretariat of the UNFCCC) and determines how the joint work will be organized. Workshops for each of the six KJWA topics will be held in conjunction with meetings in 2018-2020.</p> <p>Between each session, Parties and observers have the opportunity to submit their views (UNFCCC submission portal) on how this work should take shape.</p> <p>At COP26 Parties will review the outcomes of the KJWA.</p>

Adaptation Committee	Established a working group/focal point. The AC has also opened a call for submissions on integrating gender in NAPs and has taken further steps to deepen its engagement and action on gender. They are for instance collaborating with the PCCB on an event of gender and human rights
WIM Excom	The Wim Excom has in the capacity building on gender prioritized a number of possible actions.
<u>Nairobi Work programme</u>	<p>The NWP engages with a growing and diverse network of non-Party stakeholders to synthesize the latest knowledge on key adaptation issues and foster science-policy-practice collaboration.</p> <p>The NWP covers a wide range of working areas and themes, responding to both general and specific knowledge requests from the Parties and constituted bodies under the convention. Knowledge is collected through calls for submissions and focused exchanges with technical experts. Information is then refined and disseminated through synthesis reports, events such as the annual Focal Point Forum, the online Adaptation knowledge portal, and other digital and in-person platforms. The NWP also collaborates with partners to close knowledge gaps at the national and sub-regional levels through activities such as the Lima Adaptation Knowledge Initiative.</p> <p>The NWP publishes a newsletter and has established a <u>Knowledge to Action Hub</u> where information is disseminated. The NWP also plans events.</p> <p>The <u>Lima Adaptation Knowledge Initiative</u> (LAKI) was launched and endorsed by the COP 20 Presidency as a joint action pledge under the Nairobi work programme (NWP) between the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) secretariat and the United Nations Environment Programme (UN Environment) through its Global Adaptation Network (GAN). Activities under the initiative support the NWP's role as a knowledge-for-action hub for adaptation and resilience under the Convention</p>
Capacity Building	
PCCB	The PCCB has established a working group on cross-cutting issues. The PCCB has also developed a standard for mainstreaming gender in all PCCB events, meetings, reports, documents. This standard is contained in their report to the COP <u>FCCC/SBI/2019/13</u>
Finance	
SCF	The SCF has addressed gender in the BA and in their last SCF Forum. The SCF is planning to also integrate gender in the next SCF Forum. The SCF has appointed a Gender Focal Point.
SCF Forum	The SCF reports on the Forum in its annual reports to the COP. The SCF was mandated by the Conference of the Parties (COP), at its 17th session, to organize a Forum. The SCF Forum exists for the communication and continued exchange of information among bodies and entities dealing with climate change finance in order to promote linkages and coherence.

Transparency	
CGE	The CGE developed a gender action plan and is looking to continue their work on gender. A capacity building is scheduled for their next meeting in February.
	The CGE is tasked with supporting Parties in their reporting and in the implementation of the enhanced transparency framework under Article 13. They organize regional hands on trainings, which are complemented through webinars. The objectives of these workshops is to enhance the technical knowledge of national experts e.g. on reporting on NC and BURs.
Regional	
Climate weeks	Regional climate weeks have been organized by UNDP and the secretariat to facilitate countries' planning and implementation of their climate commitments. The climate weeks therefor often focus partly on NDCs. Regional climate weeks are seen as an important vehicle through which to increase ambition and accelerate implementation in the regions and outside of official meetings.
NDC Dialogues	In the past climate weeks have been held in conjunction with NDC Dialogues. NDC dialogues are running since 2014. In 2019 UNDP and UNFCCC used the 'gender voices' method and ensured that speakers who could share experiences of how they had worked on gender in a specific context were invited to speak on different topics, thus mainstreaming gender into the NDC dialogues.
