#### PA-ALIGN tool (2021)

These tools aim to enhance Parties' capacity for data collection, risk assessment and analysis in relation to displacement through technical support and sharing tools and practices. The capacity-building activities address capacity needs of countries and provide them the opportunity to consider migration, environment and climate change in their long-term planning.

#### Lima Adaptation Knowledge Initiative (LAKI)

LAKI aims to enhance adaptation action in subregions by closing priority knowledge gaps in all countries, in particular developing countries, including the LDCs, Small Island Developing States (SIDS) and African States. Priority-setting workshops are convened with multi-stakeholder expert groups to identify, categorize, and prioritize climate change adaptation knowledge gaps for specific subregions and sectors/themes.





## <u>Navigating the landscape of support for the process to formulate and implement national adaptation plans (2022)</u>

This publication provides an overview of the landscape of support available for adaptation and of the targeted programmes and initiatives that have been set up to facilitate the formulation and implementation of NAPs.

#### Report on NAP writing support (2022)

#### **UN Climate Change and Universities Partnership Programme**

This programme is an opportunity for graduate students to work closely with local, national, and regional partners to undertake a research project as a part of producing their master's thesis. It is designed to strengthen collaboration between the UNFCCC, UN and academic/research institutions, especially in the global South with the aim of addressing knowledge gaps that remain a critical barrier to countries implementing adaptation measures.



#### <u>Santiago network for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage under the</u> <u>Warsaw International Mechanism (2023)</u>



The Santiago network for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change was established to catalyse the technical assistance of relevant organizations, bodies, networks and experts for the implementation of relevant approaches at the local, national and regional level in developing countries that are particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of climate change.

#### NWP Action Pledge on Water (2023)

Building on the global momentum of COP 27, at which the critical role of water in climate change efforts was highlighted, an action pledge was made under the NWP to enhance knowledge and catalyse innovation with a view to scaling up adaptation actions addressing the water-climate nexus with relevant stakeholders.

The authors develop a framework for risk assessment and reduction in rder to adapt to growing climate change risks. It is revealed that microfinance institutions should focus on client isk reduction in order to ensure profitability.
