

CGE Hands-on Training Workshop for Latin America and the Caribbean Region "Preparation of the Biennial Transparency Reports"

22-24 August 2024 Marriott Panama Hotel, Albrook Mall, Roosevelt Avenue, Panama City – Panama

Background and Context

The enhanced transparency framework (ETF), building on and strengthening the existing measurement, reporting, and verification (MRV) arrangements under the Convention, and along with the adoption of modalities, procedures, and guidelines (MPGs), with common reporting tables (CRT), common tabular formats (CTF) and outlines, sets the stage for full implementation of the transparency arrangements under the Paris Agreement. The enhanced reporting requirements under the Paris Agreement necessitate a fundamental shift in the approach to meeting these obligations, emphasizing sustainable and comprehensive reporting practices.

While reporting under the Convention through national communications (NCs) will continue, biennial update reports (BURs) and international consultation and analysis (ICA) process under the Convention will eventually be superseded by biennial transparency reports (BTRs), technical expert review (TER) and facilitative, multilateral consideration of progress (FMCP) processes, for those Convention Parties that are also Parties to the Paris Agreement. The final BURs will be those that are submitted no later than 31 December 2024; and Parties shall submit their first BTRs and national inventory reports, if submitted as a stand-alone report, at the latest by 31 December 2024¹.

Recognizing the diverse national circumstances among Parties, the ETF and its MPGs offer flexibility tailored to the needs of developing country Parties. This flexibility is designed to accommodate varying capacities, providing Parties with the necessary time to bolster their capabilities across reporting periods.

Despite the flexibilities afforded, adapting to these new reporting requirements poses challenges for developing country Parties. The increased depth, scope, and frequency of reporting mandated by the ETF, including the MPGs and associated BTR requirements, necessitate enhanced readiness and technical capacity. As a result, there is a critical need for targeted capacity-building efforts focused on understanding the ETF, unpacking the MPGs and effective preparation of developing country Parties' first BTRs.

Objective and expected outcomes

The main objective of the regional hands-on training workshops is, inter alia, to enhance the technical capacity of experts from developing country Parties in preparing their first BTRs, with an aim to facilitate delivery of good quality reports by 31 December 2024.

The workshop aims to achieve the following learning outcomes:

- **Applying the MPGs:** Equip participants with the knowledge and skills to apply the modalities, procedures and guidelines in preparing their BTRs, including the common reporting tables (CRTs) and common tabular format (CTFs).
- **Facilitating preparation of the BTRs:** Provide an interactive learning experience through hands-on exercises in drafting sample chapters of the BTRs, including application of flexibility provisions.
- Leveraging strategic tools and facilitating peer to peer exchange: Introduce available tools and processes, including the electronic reporting tools and BTR reviewer training programme; as well as provide a venue for country representatives to share their experiences and best practices in preparing their BTR.
