### **MP Transport Action Event**

Description	A session focused on identifying the challenges and opportunities inherent in the effort to transform transport and deliver meaningful climate action for resilient and sustainable transport and mobility systems.
Headline	Transport ecosystem actors lead the way towards climate smart, just and resilient transport and mobility systems
Suggested outcomes aligned to narrative	<ul> <li>Understand progress so far in the transport sector.</li> <li>Enhance multi-stakeholder, action-oriented partnerships between the transport community and others.</li> <li>Learn about challenges and opportunities for implementation, with specific focus on the Global South and Africa, and provide solutions for progress.</li> <li>Glean concrete insights for action on finance and equity.</li> <li>Find consensus on priorities for 2023.</li> </ul>
Objectives	<ul> <li>This session will:</li> <li>Bring together stakeholders from the different transport sub-sectors (urban, aviation, shipping, heavy duty freight transport) to explore the specific challenges and opportunities for decarbonising their sectors, and to explore which cross-sectoral solutions could benefit them all. Specific focus will be put on solutions that are accessible and adapted to the Global South.</li> <li>Highlight avoid, shift and improve measures and give them equal weight in the discussions to showcase the importance of all for achieving truly sustainable systems that leave no one behind.</li> <li>Focus on near term actions that need to be taken to achieve 2030 sustainable development and climate goals.</li> <li>Align with the thematic priorities of the COP27 Presidency regarding urban transport, particularly on public and informal transport, walking and cycling, and ensure synergies with the initiative on the topic Egypt seeks to launch.</li> </ul>
*Participants	This will be a multi-modal, cross-sectoral event. It will also ensure participation of non-transport stakeholders, such as finance experts, women, youth and labour organisations, and others, to inform a better understanding of how the transport sector can make progress on implementing its ambitions. Speakers will represent both public bodies and private organisations to improve understanding of how they need to support each other to accelerate the low carbon transition, while building transport and mobility systems that are resilient to climate change impacts.



Key messages	<ul> <li>Climate action and decarbonisation of mobility sectors can bring multiple benefits to the Global South, on top of the benefits that mobility systems already deliver across the value chain and across society. Benefits include green jobs, the ability to facilitate a just transition, new industrial sectors, energy security, etc.</li> <li>Improve access to opportunities and goods through improved land use planning, instead of focusing only on enabling mobility. This can be achieved by enhancing active travel, particularly walking and cycling, accessible and affordable public transport systems, and efficient logistics systems enabled by digital and policy solutions that will enable a just transition to low carbon transport and mobility systems.</li> <li>Collaboration across transport sub-sectors and beyond, as well as between private and public bodies is crucial to find solutions that work for all. Financiers have a specific role to play and must be engaged now to spur the necessary implementation.</li> </ul>
