Martin Hession is a policy advisor at the Commission of the European Union, and negotiator for the EU and its Members States on Article 6 in the UNFCCC for the past 10 years. He is also Visiting Researcher at University College, London, Law School. Born in Dublin, and brought up there and in Ring, Co Waterford, where he attended St Mary's College, Rathmines, and the St Augustine's Friary School, Dungarvan. He is a graduate of Trinity College, Dublin (Legal Science) 1987, and of the London Economics 1988 (Natural Resources and Environmental Law).

Qualified as a Barrister to the English Bar in 1991 (Lincoln's Inn), he has been, a policy advisor at the UK Department for Climate Change (DECC), and at the Department for Environmental, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) 2002-2013, working there on international carbon markets, and representing the UK on elements of the first Carbon Market Legislation. He was previously an academic researcher and lecturer, lecturing at Imperial College London, and Oxford University (Now the Environmental Change Institute) (1992-2002).

His research focused on Climate Change, Sustainable Development and Science Law Policy. While at Imperial, he convened a Masters Courses (M.Sc.) on Global Environmental Change, bringing together study of the physical and biological sciences and law and economics, through practical exercises and negotiation.
