Background

As more countries seek opportunities for carbon trading under Article 6 of the Paris Agreement, a number of technical assistance and capacity building programs are being delivered to ensure buyers and sellers governments are well-informed and prepared, including on implications for achieving NDC targets. Even though some countries may have established institutional arrangements for CDM transactions, participating in Article 6 transactions will require a deeper level of institutional readiness to ensure environmental integrity of all transactions. Furthermore, engaging in Article 6 requires building the capacities of all carbon market participants beyond governments (including programme developers, verifiers, financial institutions) to align with and implement the new provisions and principles of carbon market instruments under the Paris Agreement.

The COP26 Catalyst for Climate Action is a group of partners supporting the UK COP26 Presidency in better understanding the capacity building needs of countries, including how best to improve capacity around Carbon Market Participation. At this event, the Global Green Growth Institute and Perspectives Climate Group will host an interactive discussion session to capture the reflections of government stakeholders who have been involved in carbon market capacity building efforts. The purpose of this event is to discuss past experiences, the successes and challenges faced by government stakeholders, and ways to ensure better capacity building for Article 6 participation.









Session Approach

The 75-minute event will consist of two interactive mini-sessions, each involving a short intervention from an expert panelist (5minutes max) followed by a moderated Q&A with a panel of peers, followed by audience Q&A.

Panelists will include up to 3 government counterparts, one technical assistance expert and both GGGI and Perspectives.
