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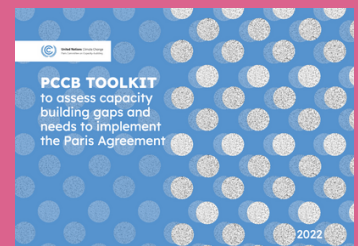

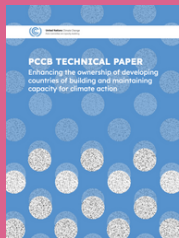
Paris Committee on Capacity-building (PCCB) Toolkit to Assess Capacity-building Gaps and Needs to Implement the Paris Agreement (2022)

1. Introduction

A. Mandate and background

1. Established at COP 21 in 2015, the Paris Committee on Capacity Building (PCCB) addresses capacity and training gaps and needs in implementing and better enforcing climate building in developing countries.
2. The priority areas of the PCCB are as follows:
 - (a) Identifying capacity gaps and needs, both current and emerging, and recommending ways to address them;
 - (b) Promoting mainstreaming, knowledge and information sharing and establishing appropriate and feasible climate action plans and related to countries, organizations and institutions with their respective mandates;
 - (c) As part of its ongoing efforts to address such priority Area A, mentioned in paragraph 2 (a) above, the PCCB determined in its 2021-2024 mandate, to make a call for submissions from Parties and non-Parties in the form of Experience, best practices and lessons learned related to improving coherence and coordination of capacity building efforts. The call for submissions was published in 23 August 2022 on the website of the PCCB and closed on 15 October 2022.
3. Since early 2022, the PCCB has addressed submissions with regard to supporting coherence and coordination of capacity building across bodies, units and divisions under the UNFCCC through the establishment and implementation of an ad-hoc working group (WG) on capacity building under the Convention and the Paris Agreement.

6. The objective of this document is to inform ongoing efforts under Activity A.2.4.1 of the 2021-2024 PCCB mandate, including recommendations in COP 27 and 28.2. It also has a broader relevance and contribution of capacity building and level of delivery of this activity.

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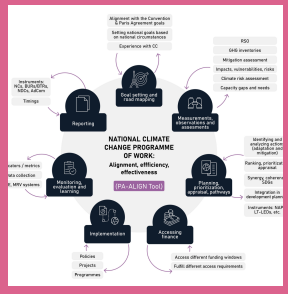

Target audience: Government actors coordinating the NAP process and stakeholders and development partners supporting adaptation planning and implementation.



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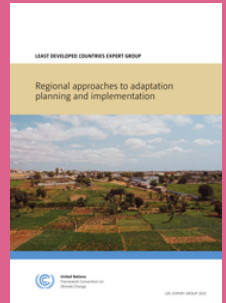

Report of the Technical Workshop on Building Capacity for Integrating Human Rights into Climate Action



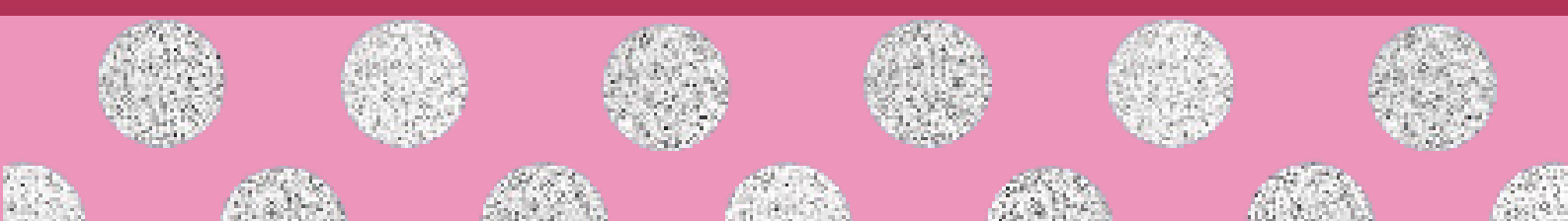
This workshop, co-organized by the PCCB and the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR), highlighted and discussed concrete capacity-building examples and tools. Participants were invited to actively share their experiences in building capacity for integration of human rights in Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) and other climate actions.

This report covers a COP 26 workshop where NGCCFPs and Parties reflected on, developed and finalized recommendations on the role of NGCCFPs.

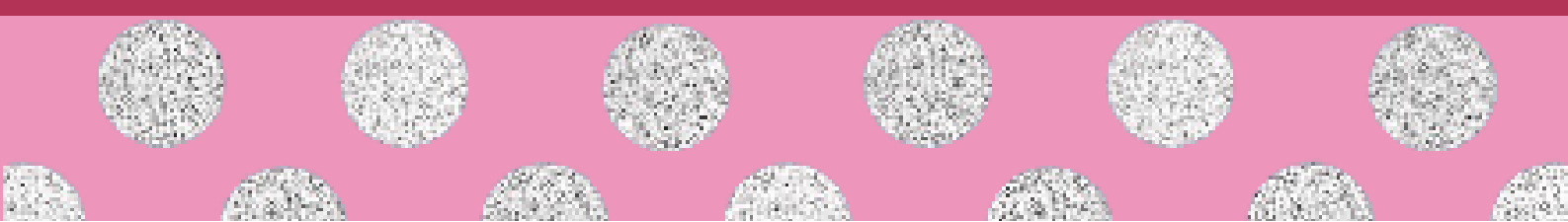

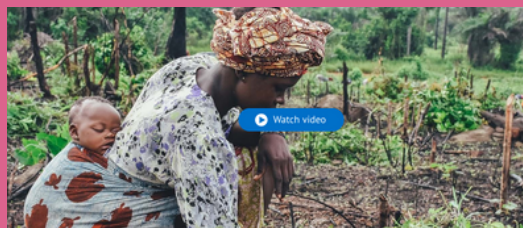
Youth4Capacity

Supported by the UN Climate Change Secretariat and the Italian Ministry of Environment and Energy Security, the Youth4Capacity programme aims at strengthening the capacities of young people while recognizing their crucial role as capacity-builders in achieving ambitious climate action. The programme seeks to build the capacities of youth to act on climate change, particularly in vulnerable countries, and promotes the active exchange of experiences and lessons learned with regards to capacity-building for or by youth while also seeking to address the linkages between climate action and the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals and three Rio conventions.

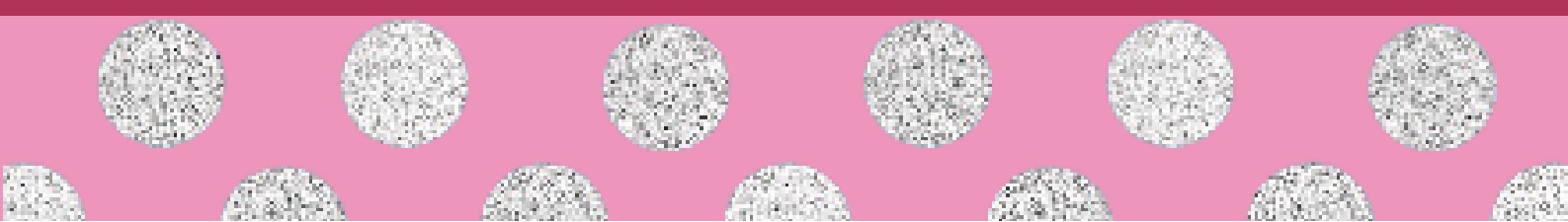
Open online course on Gender and Environment
