Concept Note

Overview

UNFCCC secretariat and its Regional Collaboration Center for MENA and South Asia, in collaboration with the "Environmental Compliance Environment Authority, Muscat, Sultanate of Oman", is organizing a four-day Regional Workshop on Article 6 and Carbon Pricing focusing on the MENA region. The overarching objective of this workshop is to foster an effective engagement with the cooperative mechanisms, including both market and non-market approaches, established under the Paris Agreement.

This workshop forms part of the UNFCCC's broader regional capacity-building initiatives to address critical gaps in implementing Article 6, which became fully operational following COP 29.

Despite the framework's potential to mobilize climate finance and accelerate NDC implementation, many Parties face challenges in engaging with Article 6's cooperative mechanisms-particularly integrating the in the NDC implementation. Some of the reported and observed gaps include limited technical understanding of the associated processes, compliance requirements, key decisions and their implications, and applicable carbon crediting mechanisms.

This workshop will provide hands-on training to enhance clarity on Article 6 rules, foster peer-to-peer knowledge exchange, and strengthen institutional readiness for market-based climate action.

Objectives

The overarching goal of this workshop is to enable a comprehensive understanding of the opportunities presented under the cooperative approaches of Article 6, and to support the operationalization of PACM, considering the approval of the maiden baseline methodology by the PACM Supervisory Body during its 18th meeting.

In particular, this workshop aims to:

- 1. Foster greater regional dialogue on effective carbon pricing strategies, stakeholder engagement, and implementation pathways
- 2. Deepen the understanding of how to effectively engage with market and non-market cooperative mechanisms under Article 6, including 6.2, 6.4 and 6.8
- 3. Assist the participants in developing better strategies and plans to embed Article 6 in their NDC implementation, and climate action policies
- 4. Facilitate a platform for sharing of best practices, challenges and experiences in engaging with Article 6 mechanisms
- 5. Strengthen the technical knowledge of the regional stakeholders about participation and compliance requirements under Article 6.
