Article 6.2 Ambition Dialogue

18 June 2025, 15:00 – 18:00, Wien 1/2

I. Mandate

Article 6 of the Paris Agreement recognizes that some Parties choose to pursue voluntary cooperation in the implementation of their nationally determined contributions (NDCs) to allow for higher ambition in their mitigation and adaptation actions and to promote sustainable development and environmental integrity.

Under Article 6, paragraph 2 of the Paris Agreement (Article 6.2), Parties shall, where engaging on a voluntary basis in cooperative approaches that involve the use of internationally transferred mitigation outcomes towards nationally determined contributions, promote sustainable development and ensure environmental integrity and transparency, including in governance, and shall apply robust accounting to ensure, inter alia, the avoidance of double counting, consistent with guidance adopted by the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to this Agreement.

As per paragraph 56 of decision 4/CMA.6, the CMA requested the secretariat, as part of the capacity-building programme referred to in decision 2/CMA.3, paragraph 12(b), to organize a dialogue, to be held in conjunction with each session of the Subsidiary Body for Implementation (SBI), among interested participating Parties and observers to exchange information and experience on how cooperative approaches in which they participate support ambition.

II. Context

At COP29 in Baku, building on the guidance from Glasgow and Sharm el-Sheik, Parties finally reached an agreement on the further guidance necessary for the full operationalization of Article 6, marking a transition to its full implementation phase. In parallel, the CMA called on all actors to work together to enable the scaling up of financing to developing country Parties for climate action from all public and private sources to at least USD 1.3 trillion per year by 2035, as part of the new collective quantified goal on climate finance (NCQG).

As Parties shall communicate their next round of NDCs, known as NDCs 3.0, with targets for 2035 this year, the role of Article 6 in supporting ambitious climate action is becoming increasingly recognised. According to the current NDCs, the number of Parties indicating their intention to use of voluntary cooperation under Article 6 of the Paris Agreement has been increasing, with 78 per cent stating that they plan to or will possibly use at least one type of Article 6 cooperation. Notably, Article 6.2 has been the most frequently communicated among the three components of Article 6¹.

In this context, Article 6 cooperation could serve a dual function: facilitating the cost-effective implementation of the Paris Agreement and catalysing large-scale finance to accelerate efforts to curb emissions, thereby supporting alignment with the Paris Agreement's ambition. Given its market-based

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nature, Article 6.2 enables participation not only by Parties but also by non-Party stakeholders, including the private sector. This also underscores the importance of ensuring both environmental integrity and market robustness in the design and implementation of the mechanism.

III. Objectives

As the first dialogue to be held in the inaugural year of the full implementation phase of Article 6, the Article 6.2 Ambition Dialogue aims to initiate discussions by addressing fundamental questions regarding the role and function of Article 6.2.

To this end, the dialogue seeks to provide a platform for Parties and non-Party stakeholders involved in Article 6 to discuss following:

- How Article 6 has allowed for higher ambition in NDCs or other climate targets;
- Whether these ambitions align with the goals of the Paris Agreement; and
- What challenges exist and what capacity-building support is needed to address them.

IV. Participations

As per paragraph 56 of decision 4/CMA.6, Parties and observers can participate in the Dialogue. Broadcast link will be available on the <u>digital platform</u> for registered delegates and observers to follow the Dialogue.

To ensure broader participation and in view of space limitations, each Party and observer organization is kindly requested to designate one representative to be seated at the main round table.

V. Moderation

The Dialogue will be led by moderators, invited by the Secretariat to lead the discussions among participants.

VI. Format

To facilitate interactive dialogues among participants, the Dialogue will follow a roundtable format. During the sixty-second session of the SBI (SBI 62), the Dialogue will consist of two parts, each lasting two hours. Each part will be thematically structured in line with the objectives outlined above to capture the experiences and insights of various stakeholders engaged in the implementation of Article 6.2.

Each part will be further divided into three sessions. Under the guidance of moderators, each session will commence with presentations by invited Parties or non-Party Stakeholders sharing their experiences or insights in relation to the guiding questions. The presentations will be followed by an open exchange, during which participants may ask questions and provide feedback.
