### ExCom 17: Summary of decisions, version adopted on 23 September, 17:45 CEST. UNEDITED

#### Item 4 Reports of the expert groups

- 1. The ExCom took note of the reports of five expert groups.
- 2. The ExCom welcomed the 3<sup>rd</sup> PoA of the TFD, and encouraged NELs EG to engage, where appropriate, in producing the endorsed outputs contained in the new PoA.
- 3. The ExCom endorsed the 2<sup>nd</sup> PoA of the TEG-CRM.

#### Item 5: five-year rolling workplan

The ExCom adopted its second five-year rolling workplan.

#### Item 6(a) Collaboration with the operating entities of the Financial Mechanism

- 1. The ExCom decided:
  - a) To continue to pursue strengthening its collaboration with the operating entities of the Financial Mechanism.
  - b) To invite the co-chairs of the GCF Board and the GEF Secretariat to the next ExCom meeting, with a view to informing ExCom's work, including its work in relation to the 2<sup>nd</sup> Glasgow Dialogue.
- 2. The ExCom agreed to request the GCF secretariat to keep ExCom informed of opportunities to provide input to GCF documents, as appropriate.

## Item 6 (b) Collaboration with the CGE

The ExCom took note of the report back from the ExCom/CGE joint brainstorming meeting, and encouraged the liaison members to continue engaging with the CGE and update and engage the ExCom on collaboration with the CGE, within existing mandates, including with regard to the training material to be produced by the CGE as well as outreach events.

#### Item 7(a) annual outreach event

- 1. The ExCom decide to hold its 2022 annual event by the end of 2022, building on the experience from the previous annual outreach event.
- 2. The ExCom took note that, in preparing the annual outreach event, the champions group would take into account the decision from ExCom 15, including the umbrella theme "achievements and challenges in a.m.a. L&D on the ground".
- 3. The ExCom decided to hold a side event at COP 27.
- 4. The ExCom agreed that the general aim of the COP 27 side event is to showcase its work and that of its expert groups. In addition, the ExCom noted that the event could also take into account the submissions by the OBNEs on the information of their technical assistance provided in developing countries, catalyzed under the Santiago Network.

## Item 7(b) 10th anniversary of the WIM

- 1. The ExCom decided to commemorate the WIM's 10-year anniversary.
- 2. The ExCom established an intersessional group of champions to advance the work related to the WIM's 10-year anniversary.
- 3. The intersessional group of champions, in furthering the work on the WIM 10-year anniversary, should take into account ideas and proposals shared during the meeting.<sup>1</sup>

### Item 8(a) how the latest science can inform policy-making

- 1. The ExCom welcomed the expert briefing by the WFP.
- The ExCom reiterated the importance of scheduling such briefings in future meetings under this item, and noted the initial ideas shared for potential focus topics (e.g., to showcase expert groups' work, countries' practices in using climate services in their climate policy/planning, climate services in averting, minimizing and addressing non-economic losses).

#### Item 8(b): Cooperation with the SBI on the Glasgow Dialogue

- 1. The ExCom decided to establish a group of champions to take the lead in the ExCom's cooperation with the SBI in organizing the 2<sup>nd</sup> Glasgow Dialogue (SB 58, June 2023), and the ExCom reaffirmed the importance of having an open and, inclusive Dialogue.
- 2. The ExCom noted the importance of consulting the incoming Chair of the SBI sufficiently early in the lead-up to SB 58 to facilitate engagement of all ExCom members in reviewing input prepared by the group of champions.
- 3. In line with the Glasgow mandate, the ExCom encouraged the group of champions to reflect on suggestions for speakers, potential themes, guiding questions, and possible format of the Dialogue, with a view to cooperating with the SBI Chair in his/her preparation for the organization of the next Dialogue.
- 4. The ExCom encourage the group of champions to engage the ExCom's expert groups, including the Action and Support, NELs and SOEs expert groups, in providing ExCom's input to the Dialogue.

## Item 8(c): Consideration of the working methods of the ExCom

The ExCom decided:

 To advance discussions and proposals on enhancing the ExCom's working modalities by establishing a group of champions to take forward intersessional work to, for example, consider developing a template for Plans of Action for the Expert groups, the Technical Expert group, and the Task Force and a document further clarifying expectations of ExCom and Expert members;
