Law: "Looking at the Law: a Window of Opportunity"

Vision	What are the visions for the future you want to explore?
Statement	We explore a vision of the future where the law will place the interests of affected communities first to build resilience, and where the law will have developed a framework for accountability in respect of emissions reductions. We explore the need for both carrot and stick approaches to change corporate behaviours (i.e. the need for regulatory changes in respect of business & human rights / ESG obligations as well as the need for corporate clients to be advised to change their governance internally). We seek to explore judicial decision-making to understand how the decision-makers of the future will decide cases.
Challenges	What challenges are you experimenting with to get there?
	Speakers will explore challenges to corporate accountability, challenges to regulation (how to come to internationally applicable standards of good sustainable governance) and the limitations of bringing about change via litigation as opposed to via changes to internal corporate governance and via community-led negotiation. Speakers will also look at the challenges around reconciling carrot and stick approaches in order to ensure that legal frameworks are effective in allowing affected individuals and communities to bring about systemic social change. Speakers will also explore the limitations of litigation in the context of mitigation / adaptation, and explore alternatives to litigation- e.g. community led negotiation.
