





Related Federal Interagency Efforts

USGCRP's Interagency Groups are the Program's primary vehicle for coordinating and implementing global change research activities within and across agencies. Working group topics span a range of interconnected global change issues and approaches to understanding and informing responses to changing environmental conditions.

Interagency Groups are designed to bring agencies together to plan, develop, and implement coordinated activities. They allow public officials to communicate with each other on emerging research directions within their agencies, the needs of their stake-

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Process of gathering information and internal coordination;

- Proactively build national government coordination of programs across the government related to Article 6 of the Convention
- Connect national government programs, activities, and initiatives related to ACE to increase alignment, demonstrate collective impact and improve domestic and international reporting.
- It takes time to develop relationships that can foster increased synergy, overall effectiveness, and productivity of Federal ACE related research, partnerships and programs.

Process of gathering information and internal coordination;

- Build and coordinate with ACE related networks that connect ACE elements
- National Communication should incorporate all elements of ACE including sub-national government, networks, organizations and institutions
- Supporting and coordinating with backbone support organizations are key to national ACE reporting. These need to be sufficiently funded and to help mobilize programs and initiatives to scale what works in ACE.


